As she places a wreath on the
National War Memorial at Ot-
tawa Sunday, a Canadian mother
will think of her three airman-
sons who were killed within 16
months during the Second World
War.
And throughout Canada, mil-
lions of other Canadians will pay
silent tribute as members of the
armed services, militia units and
veterans' organizations join forces
to observe Remembrance Day.
Mrs. A. T. Reynolds of Chat-
ham, Ont., is to represent Cana-
dian mothers at the Ottawa cere-
mony, to be attended by Govern-
or-General Massey, Prime Min-
ister St. Laurent, the chiefs of
staff and other dignitaries.

AFTERNOON OBSERVANCE
There, as in a number of other
communities, the traditional two-
minute silence is to be observed
in the afternoon to avoid conflict-
ing with normal morning church
services.
The beginning and end of the
two minutes will be marked by a
signal gun fired at Nepean Point
at approximately 2:40 p. m. local
time.
Elsewhere in Ontario special
services are to be held at veter-
ans' hospitals, in the veterans'
sections of cemeteries and at
wreath-laying ceremonies at war
memorials.

Two protestant organizations in
Winnipeg have called for special
prayers at Remembrance Day
services for Hungarians killed
while fighting Russian troops in
their strife-ridden country.
The Canadian Legion in Toronto
is to hold a special festival of re-
membrance, modelled on that
held each year at London's Al-
bert Hall.
Representatives of the armed
services will parade on the stage
of Toronto's Odeon Theatre,
where the festival is to be held
Sunday evening. A parade and
wreath-laying ceremony is to be
held Saturday, followed by a
church service at 11 a. m. Special
sunrise services at veterans' cem-
eteries will also be held on Sun-
day.

A 12-band church parade of
army, navy and air force regu-
lars and reserves is planned in Hal-
fax.
In Montreal, the two-minute sil-
ence is to be observed at 3 p. m.
The lieutenant-governor of Quebec
Gaspard Fautoux, is to take the
salute at a parade of 6,000. Two
Montreal Victoria Cross winners
are expected to be with him on
the saluting base.
As in many centres, Poppy Day
officially will be observed Satur-
day in Quebec.

Winnipeg is not holding its us-
ual parade or services in the Win-
nipeg Auditorium. Instead, nor-
mal church services are to begin
at 10:45 a. m. and a two-minute
silence is to be observed at 11
a. m.
Saskatoon is holding its Re-
membrance Day services in the
afternoon, at 3 p. m.
Some stores and offices are ob-
serving Monday as a holiday, as
in Regina, where many plan to
close.

My sake, you choose voluntarily
to give up these legitimate riches

the law actually requires of us.
Surely we forget that in common
estimation, a gift of love that costs
one nothing is a poor gift.
We Christians pride ourselves on
being conscientious citizens of
God's kingdom here on earth. We
obey all the laws—with only the
occasional infraction—and scrupu-
lously avoid getting into trouble
