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Farm Work Hampered By Wet Weather

Wet weather has hampered practically all operations at the Experimental Farm, according to Mr. Parent, superintendent. This is particularly true of the plot work being done.

Grain harvesting is proceeding when possible on the regular experimental plots on the home farm and on the various Illustration Stations in the Province, as well as on the soil fertility plots. It is reported that the yield is high but difficulty is being encountered due to the grain being beaten down and badly tangled as a result.

Grass silage experiments are continuing and recently a field was cut over for the second time this season and the silo at the Upton Farm filled.

Whenever the weather permits work is going on on the road improvement program with paving being done in the area of Birch Court. Plans are also underway for the refinishing of those roadways on the Farm which may have been paved already.

Large Shipments Of Island Beans

The large annual movement of Island grown wax beans to the canning plant at Middleton, N. S., is now underway. With most of the movement coming from the Eastern part of the Province the beans are being moved by motor truck via the Wood Islands ferry service.

Late this week large shipments were being made from the assembling points at Vernon and Alliston where heavy loads were being prepared. Federal Department of Agriculture officials have expressed the belief that the acreage planted this year is about the same as in 1952 when 650,000 pounds were sent to the factory. They believe that the quantity this season will be approximately the same. They also noted that the quality appeared to be very good this year.
