# NOTICE

## UNDER MUNICIPALITIES EXTENSION ACT

### BY-LAW (AS AMENDED)

TO INCLUDE AN AREA OF THE FORMER SCHOOL DISTRICT OF SPRING PARK WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF CHARLOTTETOWN

Section 8 of the By-law as amended now reads as follows:—

8. That the valuation of real property in the area assessed for the year 1957-1958 in the Spring Park School district as improved property shall remain unchanged for the years 1962 to 1967 both inclusive, but the general tax rate of the City shall be applied to such valuation. All other real estate in the area thereafter and hereafter assessed as improved property shall be valued by the scheduled rating system of the City, as shall all real estate in the area after the year 1967.
