Trinity Church Vacation School

Heartz Hall at Trinity United Church is a busy hive of activity these days as the vacation school opens every morning from Monday to Friday.

There are both junior and primary classes and altogether the daily attendance averages about eighty. Fourteen already busy women are giving up part of their time to teach at the school.

For the junior students, the morning starts with a period of worship followed by a period of Bible study, in which they are given instruction in the broad outline of the Biblical story.

Another display explains the purpose of the Trinity Mission project for the year, to provide more Bibles for the Cree Indians, showing among other things the Cree alphabet and examples of some Indian crafts.

The last period of the morning is spent in rhythm band drill. The primary classes follow somewhat the same routine of games and handwork in a simplified form.

The school is being held five mornings a week for two weeks, and there will be a closing on Friday evening open to all those who are interested, when the students' work will be exhibited, and they will present a play on the subject of how the Cree Indians got their Bible.

Spent Enjoyable Holiday in Europe

The extreme neatness of the people and their way of life made a distinct impression on Miss Jean Gill and her sister, Miss Doris Gill during their stay in Copenhagen, Denmark, in the course of a summer holiday spent in Europe.

They were particularly charmed with that country and spoke highly of the welcome accorded them by the Danish people. They thoroughly enjoyed a week-end at the Danish Riviera and visited the Roskilde, famous chapel known as the "Westminster Abbey of Denmark".

Leaving here in June, the Misses Gill sailed from Quebec on the S. S. Atlantic and landed at Southampton. They spent their first week-end in Britain in Winchester and later went to London where they remained for several days visiting all the points of interest. Their walking tours of the city included abbeys, castles and the famous London Meat Market.

After leaving London the sisters went to Paris for a short visit and while there on the busy Champs Elysees met Dr. Lloyd Shaw, Director of Education for this Province. He was the only Islander they met in Europe. On conclusion of their stay in Denmark, they flew back to London to take a ship for the return voyage.

Recall Accident 52 Years Ago

Today is the 52nd anniversary of the death of driver David Pound, of this city, who was killed as a result of an accident when the P. E. I. Railway locomotive he was driving went off the track near Kensington on August 25, 1900.

Mr. Pound was a well known local man and was badly scalded died the following day. When word of the wreck reached the city the victim's wife and son left here by special train with the late Dr. Warburton. When the victim's remains were brought to the city the next evening they were met at the railway station by a large group of fellow employees and Oddfellows.

Mr. Pound was at the throttle of the regularly scheduled west-bound run when the locomotive went off the tracks into the ditch as a result of broken rails. Other members of the train crew who were all uninjured were Conductor Kelly, Fireman McEldan, Baggage-master Howatt and Brakeman Halfpenny. The latter had been on the top of one of the cars and was thrown from there to the car in front and then into the locomotive tender before bouncing off that into a field. He was uninjured.

Local Sea Cadet Returns From Sweden

A trip long to be remembered has just been completed by David W. Gallant of the Sea Cadet Corps Kent of this city. His visit, which started from Quebec aboard the Canadian cruiser H.M.C.S. Quebec, took him to Portsmouth, England, and eventually across the continent to Sweden where he attended a Sea Cadet camp outside Stockholm.

The local youngster, a son of Mr. and Mrs. D.E. Gallant, 112 Elm Avenue, was one of six Canadian Sea Cadets to make the trip in company with several boys of British Sea Cadet Corps. He found the waters of Sweden too cold for swimming, but this was more than compensated for by the excellence of the food of that country and the splendid treatment accorded them by the Swedish people, the majority of whom speak English.

Leaving Sweden he travelled by train through Denmark, Germany and Holland back to England from where the group flew home by T.C.A. plane. He finished his trip from Dorval Airport to here by train.

Three Rescued From Welsh Cave ABERDARE, Wales, Aug. 25 — (AP) — Two Boy Scouts and their injured scoutmaster were dragged to safety and a hospital today after being trapped 18 hours in a limestone cave.

Coal miners, experts at underground work, worked all night with special equipment and props and burrowed through a nine-foot wall of fallen rock to effect the release. The Scouts were on an exploring expedition in Bridge Cave Sunday and were crawling on their stomachs through a narrow passage when the roof of the tunnel suddenly collapsed about 150 yards from the mouth of the cavern.
