Bob Bedard Eliminated In Dom. Tennis Ch'ships

TORONTO (CP)—Canada's last hope for the men's singles title in the Canadian tennis championships, Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., was eliminated Thursday in a quarter-final play by Atsushi Miyagi of Japan.

Miyagi, fourth-seeded foreigner in the tournament, came back after dropping the first set to Bedard, 6-7, 7-5, 6-1, 6-1.

Bernard Borzen of San Angelo, Tex., U.S. clay courts champion, and top-seeded foreigner, swept his quarter-final match with Ricardo Balbuena of Chile in straight sets, 6-1, 6-4, 6-3.

KAMO STOPS AYALA
In other quarter-final matches Miyagi's Davis Cup teammate Kosei Kamo, stopped Luis Ayala, Chilean champion and No. 2 foreign seed in straight sets, 6-4, 6-3, 6-4. Kamo is seeded third among the foreigners.

Andrew Hammersley of Chile, who upset Canada's Lorne Main Wednesday, stopped sixth-seeded foreigner Andy Paton of Ann Arbor, Mich., 6-1, 6-6, 6-4 to move into the semi-final bracket.

In the initial stages of his match it appeared Bedard might successfully continue his one-man assault on the Japanese Davis Cup team. He eliminated the third member of the Japanese team, Reijin Kamo Wednesday. Bedard edged Miyagi 6-4 in the first set and was at set point on his service, leading 5-4. From then it was all Miyagi.

RALLY BEATS BEDARD

The Japanese star rallied to tie the second set 5-5, breaking Bedard's service with a placement for the final point. Miyagi then held his own service and broke Bedard's, winning the set with a smash the Sherbrooke boy couldn't handle. In the last two sets Miyagi grew stronger, his overhead smashes were surer and he began pressing more.

In the quarter-finals of the men's doubles the second-seeded team of Lorne Main of Toronto and Luis Ayala of Chile defeated the No. 7 pairing of Reijin Kamo of Japan and Jim Bentley of Toronto, 6-0, 6-2.

Frank Wagner of Detroit defeated Zenzo Shimizu of Japan, 8-6, 6-2 in their second round veteran's single match.

Branca, a 28-year-old right-hander, was released by Detroit Tigers last week after he had failed to finish a single start this season. His season record was 3-3. The Tigers had acquired Branca from the Dodgers last summer for the \$10,000 waiver price.

To make room on the roster for Branca, the Yankees made Ralph Houk, third string catcher, a coach.

FREDERICTON, (CP)—Johnny Steele, a federal civil servant playing out of the Saint John, N.B., Riverside club, fired a fourth round 78 Thursday to win the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island amateur golf championship with a record-setting 294 for 72 holes. The old record for the two-province event was 298.

Veteran shotsman Archie Skinner of the Algonquin club at St. Andrews, N.B., won the professional title for the second year with a four over par 74 and 292 total. It was also good for the open crown.

Doug Lewis of Moncton retained the junior championship by carding 75 and a four-round total of 309. J. Campbell, Saint Andrews club, took the senior title with a 75 after two previous rounds of 77 each.

Three of the four N. B.-P. E. I. Willingdon Cup team members emerged from the competition. They are Steele, runner-up Roy Morrison, Moncton, with a score of 298, and Bob Gray, Charlottetown, who placed third among the amateurs with 299.

The other team member, M. J. Dowling of Moncton, won the trial tournament at St. Andrews. Young Lewis also will make the trip to London, Ont., and compete for the Canadian junior crown.

Ben Isner and Ralph Harley, both of Moncton, were just nosed out of the Willingdon Cup contingent, finishing fourth with 30 each.

Harry Simmonds, Charlottetown, and John Sears, Fredericton, scored 313 for the runner-up junior spot. Simmonds then defeated Sears in a three-hole playoff.

In the pro contest, Cecil Dowling of Charlottetown finished second to Skinner. His rounds were 74-72-74-74-284. Next, three strokes behind came Allan Ogilvie, Moncton.

Art MacKenzie, Charlottetown, who took the amateur and open crowns last year, ended with 314 Thursday.

Indians And Yankees Win Two; Dodgers Gain On N.Y.

Cleveland Indians finally beat down the tie-game jinx that has dogged them in Boston and whipped the Red Sox twice Thursday to stay half a game ahead of New York in the torrid American League pennant race.

New York also won a pair, tripping the third place Chicago White Sox 4-3 in 10 innings and 11-1.

Bobby Feller won his eighth game and his seventh in a row as he turned back Boston 6-3 in the opener. Bob Lemon whipped the Red Sox 5-2 in the second game.

The two teams played a 16-inning tie Tuesday night and an 8-inning tie Wednesday.

Vic Wertz hit two home runs in the first game. In the night cap Lemon had a no-hitter going through 5 1-3 innings before pitcher Skinny Brown broke the spell with a single.

Mickey Mantle drove in the tying run in the eighth, then homered in the 10th in New York's first game triumph. Six runs in the fifth, greatly helped by two Chicago errors, made the second game easy for the Yankees and pitcher Harry Byrd.

In the National League the Brooklyn Dodgers gained a game on the New York Giants who fell apart in Chicago 13-5. Brooklyn bested Cincinnati 8-5 and now trail the Giants by six games.

JACKSON'S TWO HOMERS
The Cubs scored 11 runs, only four of them earned, in the seventh and eighth innings against the league leaders, Randy Jackson

hit two home runs for the Cubs and Gene Baker circled the bases on an inside-the-park drive.

Big Don Newcombe registered his first success since June 23 although he needed late inning help from Jim Hughes. The Dodgers rocked Cincinnati pitching for 13 hits including home runs by Duke Snider and Pee Wee Reese in the National League. Eddie Mathews of the Braves figured prominently in the scoring of both teams. His two-run homer in the first, his 23rd of the season, got the Braves away to a fast lead and in the fourth he booted a grounder which led to both Philadelphia runs.

Back-to-back doubles by Hank Aaron and Joe Adcock provided the victory margin in the sixth.

Night action included Baltimore at Washington and Detroit at Philadelphia in the American League and Pittsburgh at St. Louis in the National.

Coach Scoffs At Dope Charge
HAMILTON, Ont. (CP)—Coach Carl Voyles of the Tiger-Cats has scoffed at charges by former player Bob Cross, now in Los Angeles that players in Canadian football are "doped" before the games.

"We do what other clubs in the league do and what other clubs in the States do," said Voyles. "If a player wants a benzadrine pill before a game he can have one, but we don't ask them to take any."
