Assault Charge Faces Gilchrist

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP)—Professional soccer player Cookie Gilchrist, accused of flooring a policeman with a punch, has been indicted on a charge of second-degree assault. It was disclosed Monday.

The indictment, returned Thursday by a grand jury, remained sealed until the 255-pound Negro footballer for Buffalo Bills of the American Football League appeared in court.

He did not enter a plea when arraigned. The case was adjourned but no date was set.

Gilchrist is alleged to have punched a policeman at the scene of a police station following Gilchrist's arrest May 14 on traffic charges.

Gilchrist, American Football League Player of the Year last season, was fined \$50 in a lower court for resisting a policeman and \$10 for running through a stop sign. Several charges were dismissed but still faces trial on a charge of driving without an operator's license.

At the arraignment, Gilchrist's lawyer asked that the football player be released on his own custody. The judge rejected the plea and continued bail of \$1,500.

Player's Battle Lacks Interest

NEW YORK (AP)—Almost everyone interested in big league baseball must be impressed by the brilliant pitching of Willie McCovey and the consistently fine play of the leading New York Yankees and Los Angeles Dodgers.

But what about the losers? Will Roger Craig or Orlando Piersall be the first pitcher in 20 games? Can Washington Senators finish with a higher winning percentage than the New York Mets? Will the Mets or Houston Colt .45s be the lowest team batting average? How many regular pitchers will fall to win at least one game and how many regulars will finish with a batting average under .200?

Let's look first at the potential 20-game losers. Craig, the Mets' veteran right hander, has dropped 16 decisions, 14 in a row, and leads Penn of Kansas City and Ken Johnson of Houston by three.

Cookie Gilchrist

Aaron Burns Top National Op

NEW YORK (AP)—They didn't have to light a fire under Hank Aaron. The Milwaukee star was burning up the National League batting circuit.

Aaron narrowly escaped injury July 13 when he erupted from the center of a St. Louis hotel room in which he was eating breakfast.

The slugger, outfielder, is currently on a 14-game hitting streak—two before the fire and 12 after—during which he collected 19 safeties, including two homers, which have put him only one behind the leader, Stan Francis's Willie McCovey.

Aaron also drove in seven runs last week to lift his pacesetting RBI total to 76. He is batting .312—seventh highest in the circuit—and has 26 homers.

In addition to Aaron, the National League has other hot bats moving to a scorching batting pace—Dick Groat of St. Louis, Roberto Clement of Pittsburgh and Tony Gonzalez of Philadelphia.
