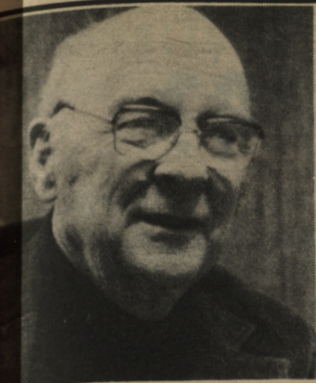


Panthers Start Winning Streak
