Needs For Craftsmen Stressed By Speaker

George Chandler, Hon. L. G. Dewar and Hon. Walter B. Shaw all stressed the need for trained craftsmen in society, at the annual convocation exercises at the Vocational School, held yesterday afternoon, at Prince of Wales.

A total of 85 more students passed through the year to join hundreds of other Vocational School graduates, and were told of the great need to further their education.

Mr. Chandler, urged the students to begin preparing for their life now, be determined to fulfill your ambition and get more education.

Mr. Chandler used an old saying to illustrate his point, "The future you are planning has its beginning today." His statements, "opportunity does not knock loud and you have to make your own opportunities to get it ahead" were readily believed by all in attendance as X. Chandler himself, a former student of the school, is a prime example of creating your own opportunities.

He is a partner in Chandler Bros., one of the largest building supply plants in the province.

E. D. MacPhail, principal of the school gave a brief outline of the activities during the past year, he also stated that in future years the requirement for entrance would be raised to the grade 10 level.

In his brief speech, Premier Walter R. Shaw stated that a \$1,000,000 vocational school will be erected in Summerside and a new building will be built in Charlottetown.

In his valedictory address, Stephen D. Grey, who thanked all the instructors and the department of education for the opportunity the graduating students were given to learn a trade.

Certificates were presented by Lieutenant Governor F. J. Hyndman while Premier Shaw made the presentation of prizes.

First Baptist Church To Mark Anniversary

Special service will be held in the First Baptist Church of Charlottetown this Sunday in observance of the 125th anniversary of the beginning of the Baptist Church in the city. Services will be conducted by the present pastor, Rev. H. L. Milton, the guest preacher in the morning being the Rev. David Hayward, L.L.B. formerly of Vancouver, B.C., and in the afternoon service being the Rev. Harold Hill, M.A. B.D. formerly of Sydney, Australia.

As early as October, 1827, the Rev. Charles Tupper began to conduct services in Charlottetown, the first convert being Thomas DesBrisay, a druggist. The services were conducted in a room in a house where Storer's Bakery now stands at 161 Kent Street. The room was furnished for preaching and seated about 100 persons. It was not until the year 1836 that the church was organized when Rev. George MacDonald became the first pastor. There were nine members: Thomas DesBrisay, John Uhlman, William Bain, Christie C. Nagall, James Caffray, Isaac Jackson, Jane Lallow, Nancy Reid and Isabella Mitchell. In 1842 the church began to raise money for the erection of a new House of Worship which was located on the northwest corner of Upper Prince and Euston Streets. At that time Thomas DesBrisay, Donald

McGill, Queens Named In Will

MONTREAL (CP) — McGill and Queen's universities have been named as beneficiaries of \$35,000 each in the will of Richard T. Mohan of Toronto. It was announced Friday. Former chairman of the board of General Foods Limited, Mr. Mohan, who died Sept. 22, 1961, held degrees from both universities. Both universities also received bequests of \$35,000 each to establish \$1,000 yearly scholarships in chemistry. They will be known as the R. T. Mohan scholarships.

WINNIPEG (CP) — Winnipeg Prime-Bombers of the Western Football Conference Friday announced signing of Harry Peter (Bud) Grant as coach for an unprecedented five-year term.

Grant, 35, joined the club in 1953 as an end and in 1957 was named head coach. He then signed a one-year contract that was made two years in 1958. Grant set another contractual record in Winnipeg when he signed the first four-year coaching contract in 1960.

Karl F. Wintemute, Winnipeg football club president, said at a press conference the new contract supercedes the 1960 contract, "which was torn up."
