Railway Matters.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

Sir,—Permit me through the columns of THE EXAMINER, to make a few brief remarks on the policy pursued by the Mechanical Superintendent towards some of the employes who are under his control.

About two months ago the employes asked for more wages, to which Mr. Stronach replied in the affirmative. To some he gave an increase of two cents per hour; and others less, according as he liked or disliked those to whom he granted the favor; and a few others he proscribed in a most glaring and shameful manner.

Mr. Stronach's one-sided policy towards the men is well known by the employes, but it is high time such proceedings by a man in a public position should be made known to outsiders. I will refrain from the present going into detail respecting this man's crooked policy towards his men, and in the meantime ask him to repair the injury he has done to those men, whose claim to a raise of wages, he has cunningly ignored, and who are as justly entitled to an additional item as his favorites are.

I assure you, Mr. Editor, it is not through any desire for newspaper correspondence I write but with a sincere wish to have the grievances of those men redressed, and I would earnestly ask Mr. Stronach to consider his conduct towards one of the men in the paint shop, whom he has treated in a very cruel manner.

I will venture the assertion that there is not a man in the Railway Shops, but will say that this man is badly treated, and I am well aware that outside of Mr. Stronach's employ, he would command more wages than his shop mates, which I am prepared to prove, if necessary on a future occasion.

I will say no more now but ask Mr. Stronach to act in a straight forward manner in his position, if not he must blame himself if he has to read in a few days what may be distasteful to him. It is to be much regretted that the good intentions of the Government should be thus abused by an unscrupulous official.

Mr. Stronach knows well in his heart that these men are badly dealt with, and that they are sons and grandsons of the men who cleared the forest and made this little Province what it is, and I, for one, will not stand by silently and allow any little flouting official to tyrannize over them at his will, without exposing his conduct in order that the proper authority may deal with him as he deserves.

Marine and Fisheries Report.

The report of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries has just been issued. It contains the fisheries statement for the year 1880, from which we glean the following particulars:—

The expenditure for the several Provinces, and services in connection with the fisheries, was as follows:— Ontario.....\$17,903 Quebec.....19,173 Nova Scotia.....17,503 New Brunswick.....17,891 P. E. Island.....7,108 British Columbia.....1,399 Manitoba.....19

The total expenditure for the Dominion on account of fisheries for the year was \$36,162.

The Temporal Power of the Pope.

A Madrid despatch states that the Cardinal Archbishop of Toledo, primate of Spain, in a pastoral letter read in every church in his diocese most violently attacked the Italian people and Government, inciting all Catholics, even princes, statesmen, politicians, and journalists, to combine and, if necessary, use force of arms to restore the independence of the temporal power of the Pope of Rome.

The Italian Minister at Madrid immediately protested. The Spanish Cabinet declared it severely blamed the primate's language and would cause strong remonstrances to be made to him. The Government has not submitted the pastoral to the Council of State, but will verbally express to the primate disapproval of his language, and will make no reply to the communication of the Papal Secretary of State on the subject.

The Spanish ambassador at the Vatican will, notwithstanding, get instructions to communicate to the Pope the regret of the Spanish Government at the disturbances attending the removal of the remains of Pius IX.

CLIPPINGS.

AYOUB KHAN has crossed the Helmand River and is marching on Candahar.

One hundred and three dogs have been summarily dealt with by the St. Henri Montreal police during the month, for being unlicensed—to live.

Midhat Pasha and most of his unfortunate fellow prisoners have been sent to El Hedjaz, in Arabia, where they will remain in exile for life.

The two halls for female students at Oxford are both full and are increasing their accommodation. The best professors have been secured as lecturers.

There have been many persons arrested, and several expulsions from St. Petersburg, in connection with the discovery of another plot against the life of the Czar.

Hay and barley have been harvested throughout Manitoba, and the crop of both is abundant. Some rain just now would greatly help cereals, the weather having been unusually dry and hot for the last two weeks.

Laborers at Winnipeg who have been receiving two dollars a day have struck for two dollars and fifty cents per day. The contractors acceded to their demands, paying two dollars and fifty cents to some, and two dollars and twenty-five cents per day to others.

The famous old English schools, Eton and Harrow, Rugby and Winchester, are constantly full to overflowing, although their cost constantly increases. Oxford and Cambridge were never so crowded with students as now.

Nothing so bothers an excellent man of good common sense as to be told that the people are cruelly overtaxed, when he knows that they are spending and earning more money than at any period for several years.

The Boy of Tunis has taken every measure to secure public safety in the environs of Tunis and Goletta, and is preparing for the organization of an army with the view of maintaining public order throughout the country.

It is reported that the United States has intimated its disinclination to join in the proposed general representation on the subject of the treatment of the Jews in Russia, on the ground that it has already instructed its Minister on the subject.

When the Princess Louise was leaving Windsor the other day for London, she found the Royal waiting-room occupied by His Majesty the King of the Sandwich Islands. To avoid a breach of etiquette the Princess had to take a seat on the platform till the train backed into the station.

The North German Gazette is publishing a series of articles leveled against the fallacies of free trade. It says that wherever the principles of free trade have been applied they have ruined the agriculturists, degraded the workmen to mere machines, and converted the country which accepted them into a tributary of Manchester.

Mr. VanStraubenzie was gazetted to the 101 Regiment a year ago from the Military College at Kingston, Ont. The military authorities there have received a telegram from the Horse Guards transferring him to the Royal Engineers. This is considered a great compliment to Canada and to the college where he was educated. Mr. VanStraubenzie is a son of the Deputy Adjutant General of Militia at Montreal.

A man named Wm. Hasey, formerly of Houlton, was found dead in the stable belonging to the Riverside Hotel, Woodstock, N. B., on the morning of the 28th. It appears he had been drinking hard for some weeks, and on the 27th fell down stairs in the hotel, after which he was placed on a straw cot in the stable, where the hostler found him at 5 a. m. dead. An inquest was held before Dr. Bruce, Coroner, and the following verdict returned: "Died from the excessive use of alcoholic liquors."

A LARGE CATCH OF SALMON.—A dispatch of the 27th says: "The run of salmon on the Fraser River, British Columbia, surpasses all precedent or calculation. Steamers and towboats laden with fish are arriving at the canneries faster than they can be packed, heads being scarce and labor high, causing many fish to be thrown away. One steamer has just arrived with over nine thousand fine salmon. The 'pack' will be enormous, as eight canneries, representing \$500,000, are in full blast.

Most people have heard of the nigger, who, when a brick fell from a scaffold on his head and broke into pieces, looked up and exclaimed, "Tell you what it is; keep them bricks off my head or dey'll be all smash, you see?" But this old joke pales in the presence of an anecdote from Bristol which relates that a man named Richard Tomes, a widower (small wonder,) attempted to commit suicide by discharging a revolver at his forehead; "but the skull resisted the bullet, which was extracted in a flattened condition." That man ought to marry again. He could endure it.

The lightning made sad havoc in many localities in New Hampshire and Vermont on Monday night and Tuesday morning. A large number of buildings were struck and many entirely consumed. A number of cattle were also killed. The damage will amount to many thousands of dollars. A despatch from Albany, N. Y., says that the lightning there on Monday night was the most terrific for years. It was accompanied by high winds, which have badly injured the crops. A woman named Roberts, while going home during the storm, was so badly frightened that it is thought she cannot live. George Robins, a freight brakeman, had one side of his body paralyzed by being thrown across the track by a bolt of lightning which struck the switch rod.
