The P.E.I. Milk Control Board has announced an increase in the price of milk on February 1st in Summerside, Montague, Borden and O'Leary. Raw milk prices in O'Leary are fifteen cents and pasteurized milk sells at present in O'Leary for nineteen cents. Although a newspaper report states: "There is no distribution of pasteurized milk in O'Leary," we have been able to get pasteurized milk in O'Leary for a long time, formerly at Sutherland's Meat Market and then at present at Saunders Meat Market. It is shipped from Summerside.
