Death Yesterday of Prominent Business Man and Former Athlete At Summerside

The death occurred at Summerside yesterday morning of one of Summerside's best known business men, Mr. M. L. Frank MacKenzie, at the age of 76 years. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John MacKenzie of Summerside where, for over half a century he followed his father in carrying on a tailoring business, and in later years as proprietor of Lee's Store. Although he had been in failing health for some time he could be found each day at his place of business on Water Street where the general management of the firm has been in the hands of his youngest son, Ross.

The name "MacKenzie" has been synonymous with the word "clothing" in Prince Edward Island since 1865 when the late John MacKenzie operated what was then known as "The American Clothing Store". M. L. Frank MacKenzie became associated with his father in the tailoring business and after the death of his father he added a line of men's furnishings. Later he gave up the tailoring business but added another line of ladies wear specializing in ladies dresses and men's sport clothing as well as ordering made-to-measure suits from ready-made manufacturers.

In his younger days the late Mr. MacKenzie was one of Summerside's most prominent athletes, specializing in hockey. He leaves to mourn his widow and two sons, Kenneth of Scotch Furriers, Truro; and Ross, general manager of the MacKenzie store in Summerside; and one daughter, Mrs. Evelyn MacAlpine, Summerside.

The funeral will be held on Saturday afternoon from the home of his son, Ross, on Notre Dame Street, to St. Mary's Anglican Church. Interment will be in the People's Cemetery.

Twelve Nurses

ferred to the Department of Health and Welfare as the biggest spending department in the government and pointed out that everything done by that department was a direct benefit to the people of this Province. Hon. B. Earle MacDonald remarked that this was the third such graduating ceremony that had taken place in this City in recent weeks and would lead one to believe that a surplus of nurses should exist. "I am sorry to say," said the minister, "that such is not the case." He observed that a large number of graduates are leaving the Province to practice their profession. He hoped that in the near future, the Government would be able to offer sufficient incentive for many of those to remain here.

Mr. MacDonald told the nurses that he wanted them to know how much his department appreciated the time and work they had spent in their training. He felt that they were to be congratulated even more than those of their profession in other types of hospitals. That better housing facilities and general improved conditions were in the offering for nurses was promised by Mr. MacDonald.

Dr. R. O. Jones told the graduates that if he were to offer them some advice as to how to obtain a measure of success, he would probably be a little confused. "After spending the last twenty years listening to people who get themselves into trouble, we are still unsure of many things," said the doctor. "This transition period through which we are passing is many times we don't know where we are going. In this situation," said Dr. Jones, "we have many people who are ready to cope with it but at the same time we have a larger majority who cannot cope with it and they break down under strain. That is why so much stress is being placed upon mental illness and the care of the mentally ill. As well as the things that make us anxious are the things that tend to make us less secure," said the psychiatrist. He went on to point out that in the days of our grandparents it was not unusual for a man to be born, live and die in the same house. In this situation," said Dr. Jones, "a person enjoyed through the nearness of friends and relatives a measure of stability. The speaker noted that the closely knit family group no longer exists. He took for example the fact that a person living in the urban areas quite often does not know the name of his neighbor across the street even though their children may play together. "And so it is," he said, "when a family or trouble takes place in a family they pick up the phone and call up some outsider. Once again the family relations are broken down."

Miss Kate Woodman, Alberton's oldest resident, is today receiving congratulations on the occasion of her 98th birthday. Miss Woodman was born at "The Point" a part of Alberton South, and with the exception of a few years spent with relatives, has resided here all her life.

She is a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John D. Woodman, who came to the country from England, bringing with them, in those pioneer days not only their household furnishings, but cattle, horses, seeds, etc.

Mr. Woodman came to Alberton as Cunard's agent and one of his duties was the collection of harbor dues from American vessels which in those days came here in large numbers. Besides acting as Cunard's agent, Mr. Woodman collected rents and taxes. Before the railroad was built he travelled to Charlottetown on horseback to deliver these collections, carrying a brace of pistols in case of attempted robbery en route. Later he was appointed first clerk of the County Court.

When Miss Woodman was a child the nearest school was some three miles or more distant from her home and prevailing conditions made it undesirable for her to walk so great a distance alone. Thus it came about that her parents sent her to live for a time with relatives in New Brunswick where she was able to receive some education.

A woman of culture and high principles, friendly and hospitable, "Aunt Kate" is held in high esteem by all who know her.

For some years she has been afflicted with rheumatism and un-

able to leave the house but she has retained her happy, cheerful disposition and devoted the time to reading, knitting and sewing. More recently she has engaged in less activity of this kind and her memory is less keen than in former years, but she enjoys good health. The day will be spent quietly at the home where she lives with her niece, Miss Catherine Woodman.
