TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. The Currie-Crisp Scandal.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 21. It is believed that a special committee of the Methodist Conference has made definite arrangements for an inquiry into the charges of immorality made by D. D. Currie against Rev. R. S. Crisp. Probably one of the ministers will formally prefer a charge, so as to bring it within the jurisdiction of the Conference. The inquiry may be called at St. John within a few weeks.

English Mail Service.

MONTREAL, Oct. 21. An arrangement has been made by the Postmaster General extending the Allan's contract for the weekly English mail service with the Dominion Line, the latter putting on the Labrador and Vancouver in summer and receiving two-fifths of two contract price, while in the winter time the Dominion will get half and put on the Labrador, Vancouver and Sagin.

A Big Swindle.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21. Edward Goodacre, manager of the New York Branch of the House of Redfern Bros., who keep a clothing establishment in London, has been arrested on a charge of procuring the smuggling of goods into this country. It is charged that the concern has swindled the United States out of \$100,000 annually by evasion of tariff.

The Boodlers Arraigned.

QUEBEC, Oct. 21. There was quite a dramatic scene in the criminal court yesterday when ex Premier Mercier made a speech to the judge asking for a speedy trial, justice and British fair play. The trial of Mercier and Pacaud was set for Saturday.

The Graveyard Insurance Case.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 21. Gideon Reid, who was charged with Weston Brothers with fraud in the graveyard insurance case, cannot be found. The constable has given up the search and the trial of the others will go on at the next county court here.

The Highland Regiment.

OTTAWA, Oct. 21. General Herbert has refused permission to organize a regiment of Highlanders at Victoria, B. C. He recommends encouraging and strengthening the corps of artillery, as most required in that Province.

The Seal Catch.

OTTAWA, Oct. 21. The value of the Canadian seal catch in British Columbia this season is estimated at half a million dollars, showing a decrease of fifty per cent. as compared with last season.

Dr. Connell Dead.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 21. Dr. Charles Connell, of Woodstock, is dead. He was one of the most popular men in the country.

Weather Bulletin.

TORONTO, Oct. 21.—10 a. m. Winds mostly northwest, fair weather, not much change in temperature.

General Telegraphic News.

MONTREAL, Oct. 19.—The Star's cable says: Sir John Abbott, Canadian Premier, and Hon. Geo. E. Foster, Dominion Minister of Finance, began work to-day at the Colonial office. They desire to go over pending questions with British ministers and will especially discuss the difficulties in the way of the adoption of the suggestions of the Canadian House of Commons regarding closer diplomatic relations with foreign nations.

KINGSTON, Oct. 19.—Principal Grant, of Queen's University, announces that nominations to one of the science scholarships, instituted by the commissioners for the London exhibition of 1884 for the students who have indicated a capacity in science or its applications, and which are of the annual value of £150 sterling, have been placed at the disposal of the senate of Queen's college.

MONTREAL, Oct. 19.—It is announced that the contract between the Dominion Government and the Allan Steamship Co. for the carrying of the mails between Great Britain and Canada has been renewed for another year and that arrangements have been made whereby the best boats of the Dominion Line as well as to be utilized in carrying English mails to and from Canada.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Oct. 19.—Dr. Francis Dowling, of this city, after a year of assiduous labor, has prepared a report on the effects of tobacco chewing on the eyes. He made a study of 3,000 persons employed in the various tobacco manufacturing of this city, and embodied with the results in their cases those of studies made by the doctors of Paris and Berlin. Of the 3,000 under observation, a close study was made of 1,500, all males, selected at random. He found that ninety-five per cent. suffered with visual troubles, and nearly as many exhibited muscular deterioration. It was also demonstrated that tobacco chewing is far more harmful than smoking.
