POLICE COURT.—One drunk occupied the police court docket today.

THE CARROLL.—The steamer Carroll left Port Hawkesbury at 5.30 o'clock this morning, and is expected here at about 5 o'clock this evening.

THE BAND CONCERT.—The Artillery will not be able to appear on Queen Square to-night, but hope to be able to give another of their popular band concerts in a short time.

CHAMBERLAIN.—Judge Hensley will deliver judgment in the Upper Prince Street School case at 11 o'clock next Monday morning, instead of to-morrow, as previously reported.

KING'S COUNTY EXHIBITION.—We are in receipt of the prize list of the King's County Exhibition. It is in some respects an improvement upon its predecessors, and includes a blank form upon which farmers can make their entries.

NEW USE FOR DOGFISH.—Victoria beach fishermen are somewhat lechered over large quantities of dogfish which are in the bay at present. Some of the industrious are catching them for their livers and disposing of the fish to F. W. Thorne, who is using them as a fertilizer on his farm.—Digby Courier.

ADMITTED TO BAIL.—Pursuant to an order of Mr. Justice Hensley, William Larter was today admitted to bail, himself in the sum of \$2,000 and two sureties—Charles Ryan and John Larter—each in the sum of \$1,000. Larter breathes again the air of freedom.

SCOTTISH GATHERING.—We direct attention to the train arrangements in connection with the Caledonian Club games to be held at Souris this year. A special leaves Charlottetown at 7.15 a. m. (local time), returning the same evening. The 16th of August will be a big day in Souris. These games are held by the Caledonian Club of P. E. Island, and are always a success. There will be no gathering at Charlottetown this season.

SCHOOL BOARD.—At a meeting of the City School Board held last evening, it was decided to postpone consideration of the matter of two daily school sessions. Mr. Allan McInnis was appointed junior of West Kent Street School, in the place of Mr. John Vance, resigned. Queen Square School was rented for a further term of five years.

POLITICAL CONVENTION.—A convention for the third Electoral District of Queen's County will be held at McLeod's Hall, Charlottetown, on Friday, the 18th day of August, instant, at 11 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating two candidates to oppose the present Government at the approaching general election. A full attendance of friends of the Opposition is requested.—W. E. Dawson, President.

THE MARKET.—The attendance both inside and outside at the market to-day was unusually large, and throughout business was quite brisk. Inside, prices were little changed, but outside a slight change was to be noted. New hay sold at from 45 to 60 to 70 cents per bushel, oats at from 45 to 48 cents per bushel; mackerel sold at from 3 to 6 cents each, and cod at from 2 to 5 cents each.

NOVA SCOTIA BRICKS FOR HAYTI.—The Critic says: Mr. J. de Groot, consul of the Netherlands to Hayti, has been in Halifax this week. Mr. de Groot is a member of a large business firm in Hayti, and he is looking up the prospects of trade between his island and Nova Scotia. He has decided to charter six vessels to carry brick from the province to Hayti during the present month. Mr. de Groot is of the opinion that before long our brick will be extensively exported to Hayti. He is also interested in our fish-curing industry.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

HOURS AT SCHOOL.

Sir,—The question which has been raised of a proposed change of school hours is a very important one. Three considerations are involved, viz., the convenience of the teachers, the convenience of housekeepers, the welfare and physical health of the children. Now, the last of these, viz., that of the welfare and health of the children, is paramount to all others. No consideration, not of the highest importance, or the convenience of teachers or housekeepers, should be allowed to interfere with the children's physical health. It is barbarous to force little children to be at school at 7 o'clock, at which hour, owing to their hurry at the early hour, they eat very little; then to commence school exercises at 9 o'clock, work almost continuously until 2; almost to go without food from the early and imperfect breakfast until 2.30 o'clock, and then to partake of a cold or lukewarm dinner, for which they have little or no appetite. It is no palliation of this (I had almost said crime) that they are allowed two recesses of 15 minutes each. I am informed that very little benefit results from their eating during these short periods. Whatever views the teacher may have, I have no doubt that they, being without exception just and generous, will submit their opinion to considerations of the children's welfare. But whether they do not, we must not forget that the schools are instituted for the children, and not for teachers.

One of the most sacred duties, indeed, I may say the most sacred duty, we have to perform, is to our utmost to develop the physical health of our children. "Mens sana in corpore sano." They are helpless. God gave them into our keeping. Let us do our duty. I for one am strongly in favor of a change of hours identical with, or similar to, the one fore-mentioned in your article of yesterday.

A PHYSICIAN.

Sir,—On reading your article last evening, I felt like exclaiming with the defunct Artemus Ward, "them's my sentiments." I can see but one reason for the proposed change, and that a business one. A nice tasty lunch and a good warm dinner right out of the oven on their return at 2 p. m. satisfies my children and maintains their good health. I had no doctor last year. The children have nearly all the afternoon to romp and play, and go to bed, after a hearty supper, with rested minds and tired limbs. Keep them at their lessons till dusk on winter days, and they will have their brains and nerves excited, and will not sleep so well.

HEATHERDALE NOTES.

Haymaking is about completed in this section. The crop, owing to the long "spring drought," is a very light one. Contrary to the expectations of the farmers, the potato bugs have not appeared here in as large numbers as last season, and there has been no demand whatever for the Government's supply of Paris green. The few bugs that did appear were easily kept down by hand picking, and there is now every appearance of an unusually fine crop of potatoes.

The people of this district, always attentive to educational matters, have recently erected at a cost of upwards of \$700, a fine building, containing the schoolrooms and a spacious public hall. The majority of the young men, who, within the last ten years have gone from this place to seek their fortunes in the Western States are now returning to their former homes. While most of them appear to have succeeded in collecting a moderate supply of Uncle Sam's cash, yet they nearly all will make their homes for the future in this Island, having come to the conclusion that it has some advantages equal to those of far away fields.

Island politics are now becoming the principal theme of interest. It is the general opinion here that our respected Liberal-Conservative candidates of the Fourth District of Kings will have an easy victory over their opponents, whoever they may be. If, as your correspondent reports, Mr. Scrimgeour is to be sent here to contest this District, we can but send him a message of condolence for his hard fate.

Heatherdale and adjoining settlements were first peopled about fifty years ago by settlers from the Western Highlands of Scotland. Although their sons now cultivate the farms upon which they toiled, yet many of these old pioneers are still living, and many are the tales they can relate concerning the legends and traditions of their native hills. These men, when they came to the Island, spoke only the rich and impressive Celtic language, and even yet most of the residents of this place can read and speak both languages with equal ease. I recently attended a religious service in this parish, where upwards of 800 persons were present, all listening with the greatest attention to the reverend lecturer as he discoursed concerning the truth of the Gospel in the beautiful language of Eden: Time and tide have washed away like gems upon the strand, many of the olden life's memorials.

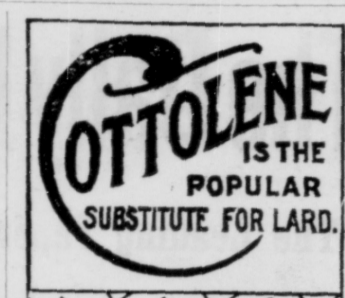

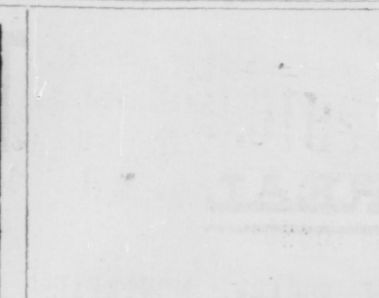

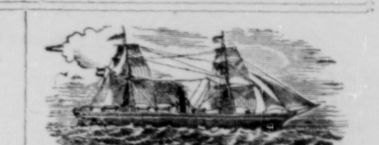
