## OUTCOME OF TARTE'S PROPHECY.

### "Wait Until You See Us Next Year."

### GOVERNMENT HAVE TO RAISE A TEMPORARY LOAN.

Increased Expenditure For Seven Months of \$2,933,000.

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.)

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.—The Dominion Government is going it apace.

"Wait until you see us next year," said Tarte, some months ago; and the public, has not had long to wait.

Last month in order to meet increasing liabilities the Government had to negotiate in London a temporary loan amounting to £500,000 sterling. Capital expenditure advanced from \$2,719,000 to \$5,652,000 this year, an increase for seven months of \$2,933,000.

The revenue for last month, \$3,550,000, was practically the same as in January, 1898, the increase being only \$33,000.

The expenditure, however, \$6,540,000, was \$234,000 in excess of last year.

Postal revenue for January fell off \$69,000, the loss under this head being \$199,000.

### The Rifle.

OTTAWA, February, 8.—General Hutton recently addressed to the president of the Ottawa Rifle Association and through him to officers of the militia in general a long by communication, inviting careful consideration by the council and soliciting its cooperation towards securing a permanent improvement in rifle shooting among different Canadian corps.

General Hutton thinks that in the development of rifle shooting the D.R.A. exercises a most important function and has a great responsibility. He seeks with its co-operation to place the rifle practice and musketry generally of the Canadian militia upon a higher basis. The following points have been recommended to the consideration of the military authorities.

1. The reduction in size of bull's eye used at D.A.R. matches and an increase in range fired at.

2. The encouragement of mass and individual firing exercises, the former being regarded as preliminary to the latter, which for battle purposes is all-essential.

3. Firing at moving objects is considered as a most essential practice in which European arms are now being carefully instructed.

4. Disappearing objects. The great point to be insured with troops on active service when required to act individually is that they shall be able to take aim and fire in the most rapid possible manner at an object which will only present itself as a target for a limited space of time. In other words, a rifle man should be trained as sporting shots.

Lieutenant Colonel Gibson, president of the D.R.A., has replied expressing pleasure and willingness to co-operate with the G.O.C. in the accomplishment of the above suggestions. He fully agrees with the forms outlined and is strongly in favor of increasing the ranges and thinks much better work can be done at 800, 900 and 1000 yards than is now at five and six hundred. It is probable the suggestion of the major-general will be incorporated in the regulations governing the year's D.R.A. matches.

### THE HOCKEY DISPUTE.

SIR.—According to the Summerside Pioneer of the 6th inst., the Star's hockey team of that town seem to be displeased at the referee's decision in the recent game played at Charlottetown between the above team and the Crescents of this city. As every one knows the result of the game was a draw. The referee reserved his decision, and not until several days afterwards did he award the game to the Crescents, thus putting the Stars out of the race for the intermediate championship and trophy. The rules of hockey distinctly state that in case of a draw the teams are to play off until a goal is scored by one side or the other. Now, sir, I presume the Stars know the rules, at all events they were informed that the Crescents were on the ice waiting to play off. But the Summerside team refused to accept the challenge consequently the game was decided against them. I would like to know where their grievance comes in? As for being treated un-sportsmanlike I think that is absurd. So far as I know the Crescents on every occasion, with the exception of their last visit, have entertained them and done everything in their power to make their visit a pleasant one. I must say that if any hockey teams have reason to complain of being treated in an un-sportsmanlike manner I think it is the Charlottetown teams that visit Summerside. Now, Sir, the Pioneer makes another statement which is both false and misleading viz., "the Crescents of Charlottetown went to Crapaud last Wednesday advertised as "the team that defeated the Stars." It is true they went to Crapaud but untrue that they advertised as the team that defeated the Stars. As a matter of fact they had nothing whatever to do with the advertising. They still have another grievance; they claim to have a written agreement that the Crescents would play a return match in Summerside on a date to be decided upon by the Stars. Its a good thing to hear. But I would like to know from what member of the Crescent hockey team they obtained it. Now, Sir, I won't want to take up any more of your valuable space with the would-be grievance of a defeated Hockey team. But I will say in conclusion that should the Crescents win the Intermediate Championship, I have no doubt but the above team will invite the Star's to Charlottetown and give them a chance to regain their lost laurels.

### Short of Ammunition.

MADRID, February 9.—Private advices received here represent the Filipinos as being short of ammunition, which they are doing their utmost to obtain by offering big prices.

The rebels, however, assert that General Rios, the Spanish military representative who is now at Manila, where he went after his surrender of Iloilo to the insurgents, gave them 5,000 Mauser rifles and 3,000,000 cartridges in exchange for prisoners. General Rios denies this statement.

## A CANADIAN MILITIA ORDER.

### The Cavalry to be made Into a Brigade.

AT THE NEXT SUMMER'S DRILL SEASON, IF POSSIBLE,

When an Attempt will be Made to Increase its Efficiency.

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.)

OTTAWA, Feb 11.—A Militia General order issued today says it is hoped that during the summer drill season, means may be found for concentrating a majority of the cavalry regiments into a brigade, when an opportunity will be afforded the Major-General personally assisting the commanding officers and all ranks in achieving a result which will place the Canadian cavalry upon a higher plane of efficiency than hitherto.

### AGUINALDO'S STATEMENT.

The Other Side of the Question.

MANILLA, Feb. 9.—Aguinaldo issued a proclamation on Saturday saying:—

"I order and command: First—That peace and friendly relations with the Americans be broken and that the latter be treated as enemies, within the limits prescribed by the laws of war.

Second—That the Americans captured be held as prisoners of war.

Third—That this proclamation be communicated to the consuls and that congress order and accord a suspension of the constitutional guarantee, resulting from the declaration of war."

Aguinaldo's proclamation of Monday gave the outbreak of hostilities was "Unjustly and unexpectedly provoked by the Americans," refers to his manifesto of January 8, publishing the alleged grievances of the Filipinos at the hands of the army of occupation and the "constant outrages and taunts which have been causing misery to the Manillans," and refers to the "useless conferences," and "Contempt shown for the Filipino Government," as proving a "premeditated transgression of justice and liberty."

The rebel leader also refers to the former losses of the Filipinos, but says "slavery is better," and calls upon them to "sacrifice all upon the altar of honor and national integrity."

He insists that he tried to avoid, as far as possible, an armed conflict, but claims that all his efforts "were useless before the unmeasured pride of the American representatives," whom he charges with having treated him as a rebel. "Because I defended my country and would not become the instrument of their dastardly intentions."

Aguinaldo concludes with saying: "Be not discouraged. Our independence was watered freely by the blood of martyrs and more will be shed in the future to strengthen it. Remember that efforts are not wasted that ends be gained. It is indispensable to adjust our actions to the rules of right and to learn to triumph over our enemies."

### TO CHANGE LONDON'S RULES.

New Form of Government For the Biggest City in the World.

LONDON, Feb. 10.—The municipal government of London has long been under a cumbersome, disjointed system, without responsible head or co-operative departments. Many attempts have been made to reform it, but little has been accomplished.

A bill will be presented at the present session of Parliament providing for a re-organization. As this bill has Governmental approval, London may at last do away with its innumerable boards, vestries, committees, and departments.

It is proposed to leave untouched the historic old walled city government, with its Lord Mayor, aldermen and guilds.

Outside of this ancient heart of London, however, twenty-nine municipalities or boroughs will be created, each with a Mayor and Council, to exercise purely local functions.

The London County Council, which is now the ruler of London, will continue in existence and legislate on affairs affecting the whole municipality, such as control of police and fire affairs, the administration of justice, drainage, and parks.

The Duke of Connaught.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—By the death of the young Prince Alfred, the Duke of Connaught becomes heir to the reigning Duke of Saxe-Coburg. It is well known that the Duke of Connaught's ambition is to become commander-in-chief of the British army. Now he will have to choose between this and resigning as a German sovereign. If he elects to remain an Englishman, he will renounce the Saxe Coburg succession in favor of his eldest son, Prince Arthur. It is possible, however, that the Duchess of Connaught, who is a daughter of Prince Frederick Charles, the Red Prince, may find the ambition of becoming a reigning sovereign in her own country irresistible.
