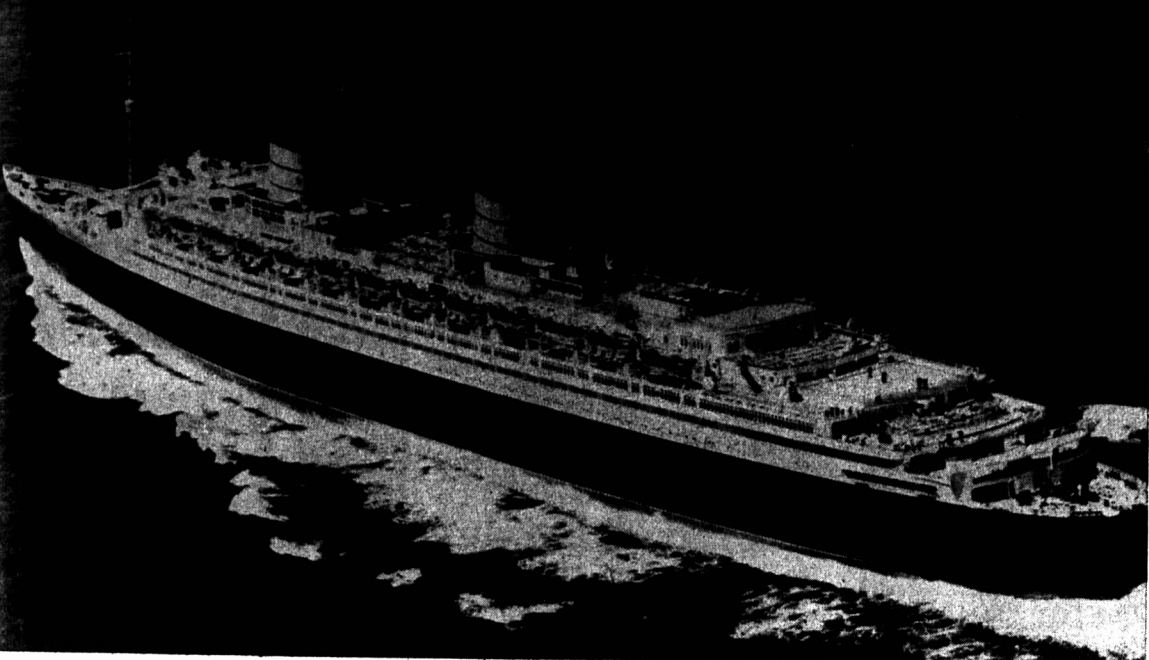

RAILWAY UNION CONCERNED ABOUT ECONOMIC OPERATION OF DIESELS

MONTREAL, (CP) — A union spokesman says thousands of jobs are going "out the window" now that Canadian railways are switching to diesels. "Hardest hit are men who service locomotives in the shops," Harry Smith, president of Division Railway Employees Department (AFL), said in an interview. The old Puffing Billys need far more work than the diesels. "From our experience with United States railways—which are already dieselized—we know that 39 per cent of our jobs will go out the window when the program is completed," said Mr. Smith. This would amount to some 7,800 jobs. Mr. Smith said a total of 40,000 men work in the shop trades in Canadian Pacific and Canadian National railways, and about half of these are on the "locomotive side"—such as machinists, helpers and apprentices. "The introduction of the diesels has most effect at shops exhibiting 'genuine poignancy' in her 'fine voice'."
