Communist To Receive Commendation Award

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell has been notified by the American Association for State and Local History is awarding a Certificate of Commendation to Nell A. Matheson of Charlotteville in recognition of the outstanding nature of her series of feature articles in the field of local history which have been appearing in the columns of The Guardian.

As farm and provincial editor of The Guardian and The Evening Patriot, Mr. Matheson is author of the weekly column "Across the Island".

Mr. Matheson's work was recommended for recognition by the provincial nominating committee, of which the Chief Justice is chairman, and is one of the eight publications in Eastern Canada (including Ontario and Quebec) which will receive an award of certificate of commendation for the past year.

The chairman of the Eastern Canada nominating committee is George McBeath, director of the New Brunswick Museum at Saint John, N.B., who is well known to historians in this province.

The articles published by Mr. Matheson have been greatly enjoyed by the readers of The Guardian, the Chief Justice observed, and his many friends will congratulate him on this international recognition of her merit.

5 Escapees Unrained And Now Plead Guilty
