

# Dancing, Fiddling Contests Planned

## A REAR TIRE BLEW AND TRUCK UPSIDE DOWN

### Truck Riddled Of Butter Ditched When Rear Tire Has Blown

When it finally came to a stop the truck was halfway into a ditch with its cab resting on the pavement.

## Two Public Service Unions Vote To Form Major Group

WINNIPEG (CP) — Two public service unions voted Monday to merge to form Canada's biggest national union.  
Delegates to the wrap-up convention of the National Union of Public Employees voted 232 to 71 in favor of the merger, while the National Union of Public Service Employees endorsed the unity move unanimously.  
The NUPPE poll-call vote came after a Toronto local threw a monkey wrench into the merger working to set up its Canadian Union of Public Employees.

considered favoring the treaty, Senator Edwin L. Mechem (Rep. N.M.) announced during Monday's debate that he will vote against it. And Senator John L. McClellan (Dem. Ark.), one of three senators whose stand had not been indicated, also declared he will vote to reject the pact.  
This made 18 senators who have made such declarations. Eighty senators have said or indicated they will vote for the pact. Two are undecided.  
About 100 nations already have signed the nuclear pact to ban all but underground nuclear testing.

## SOLITARY LADY REACHES 100

PRETORIA, South Africa (Reuters) — Mrs. Minnie Fraser, who describes herself as the "little old lady nobody knows," celebrated her 100th birthday Monday—alone.  
"I have no children, I live alone, no friends, no visitors and all my relatives are in England," said Mrs. Fraser. Born in England, she came to South Africa in 1885 to "get rid of a chest complaint."  
Despite her solitude, Mrs. Fraser said she is "quite content" spending her time reading newspapers and "looking up my future in astrology books."  
"My main hobby is to go on living," she said, adding that she drove a car until she was 95.

## Accident Claims Second Victim

NEWCASTLE, N.B. (CP) — A fatal accident near here Saturday that killed a 20-year-old bridegroom claimed a second victim Monday.  
John Paul Doiron, 33, driver of a car that led the road and struck a culvert near his home at Patterson's Sliding, died in hospital here of injuries received in the crash.  
Ronald William Painter, a passenger in the Doiron car who was married six hours before the accident, died Saturday.  
In hospital with a broken leg is Painter's bride, the former Elizabeth Doiron. She is a sister of John.  
Five other persons, all passengers in the same car were thrown from the vehicle. They were in hospital here with undetermined injuries.

## Martin-Gromyko Hold Talks On Matters Related To UN

UNITED NATIONS (CP) — External Affairs Minister Paul Martin met for more than an hour late Monday with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko.  
He declined afterward to say what issues had been brought up or whether the two had discussed Prime Minister Pearson's proposal for enlarging the United Nations Security Council.  
He said only that they had had a "very good discussion" of matters that are in part related to the UN.  
Earlier in the day the Canadian minister had lunched with Mrs. Vijaya Lakshmi Pandit, India's chief UN delegate and the sister of Prime Minister Mongi Birla.  
During the afternoon he met for almost an hour with Tunisia's Foreign Minister Mongi RETURN TODAY  
Martin returns to Ottawa today for Canadian-Japanese trade talks but will return to the UN later in the week.

At school-closing time, the teen-agers were released from the building a few at a time. Police were on guard throughout the area.

During a combined vacation and business trip planned for the end of the month, Premier Walter R. Shaw said yesterday he will discuss matters pertaining to Confederation with Premier Jean Lesage in Quebec.  
The premier also plans to meet with officials of several federal government departments in Ottawa. "I plan to call at the department of agriculture, northern affairs, public works and possibly industry," he said. Other business will take the premier to Toronto.

## Transport Dir. Conducts Survey Of Truck Traffic

A truck traffic survey that should provide valuable information to the government in its policy of providing all-weather roads in the province is being conducted by Graham Rogers, director of transportation.  
The survey takes in trucks entering and leaving the province via Borden.  
In the period from Aug. 16 to Aug. 31, the number of trucks entering the province at Borden was 236. Of this number, 119 went to Charlottetown and 80 to Summerside.  
In the same period, 225 trucks left the province. Of these 71 came from Charlottetown and 31 from Summerside.  
The survey deals with trucks that are weighed on the scales at the ferry terminal.  
Mr. Rogers said the information gained through the survey company estimated damage at \$250,000.
