BYRON'S STATUE BY THORWALDSEN.—A case of an extraordinary nature, and in which the names of two of the greatest characters of the age will figure, is about to be brought before the London tribunals. Thorwaldsen, as it is well known, had executed a colossal statue of Lord Byron, which he considered as one of his best works, and presented it to the chapter of Westminster, on condition of its being placed in that cathedral, beside the monuments of other poets. The chapter at first accepted the offer; but it is equally well known that some scruples were raised afterwards against placing the author of "Don Juan" in this national mausoleum, and the case containing the precious marble was never claimed by the chapter. The testamentary executor of Thorwaldsen being informed of this state of things, made some inquiries, and the masterpiece of Thorwaldsen was found lying on the floor of a cellar in a state of extreme deterioration, amongst the fragments of the case, which the humidity of the place had reduced to a state of perfect rottenness. Consequently, a person duly authorised by the executors addressed a formal reclamation to the authorities, but when the Custom House officers went with him to the cellar, it was found that the statue had disappeared, and nothing but fragments of the case remained behind. The Executors then addressed to the Custom House a demand for indemnity. This, however, was refused, under the plea that it cannot be answerable for goods refused by the parties to whom they are addressed, and that such goods remain in their stores solely at the expense and risk of those to whom they belong. At this stage, in fine, the executors have resolved on bringing an action for damages against the Custom House of London. The sum claimed is £30,000 (750,000*l.*), at which the statue was valued by the artists of Rome on its being shipped to London.

Boston dates to the 3d inst. have been received, from which we have extracted as largely as our limits would permit.

The seat of government in Canada has been removed from Kingston to Montreal. The Governor General made his public entry into the latter city on the 24th June.

TRIAL OF THE SALADIN'S CREW.—We understand that a Court, for the trial of these men will be organized on Friday next, when the Grand Jury will be sworn, and the other legal and necessary preparations made.—Their trial will take place on Tuesday or Wednesday following.—Halifax, July 9.

SUPREME COURT.—On Thursday the 4th inst, Margaret Collings was arraigned and tried for administering poison to her mother Catherine M. Faehin, about the month of March last, with intent to kill. The case for the prosecution lasted until mid-day on Friday, and the rest of that day was occupied in the speech of Mr. Binns, as Counsel for the prisoner. About one o'clock on Saturday the Jury retired, and in about an hour and a half returned with a verdict of Acquittal. The evidence on behalf of the Crown in this case consisted principally of that which was obtained from the Mother of the prisoner, and her Sisters, and was certainly given under very different feelings and views to those entertained by them, while the life of the former was in danger, and widely at variance with those expressed at that time to the medical men called in. The difference of them at the trial however seemed to throw doubts on the subject, and the Jury very properly, under direction of the Court, gave the prisoner their benefit.

On Saturday afternoon, the following persons who had been convicted during the Term, received sentence:—Henry Vaughan, a private soldier, in the Rifle Brigade, for stealing a side of leather from the war-house of Mr. David Wilson, merchant, in Charlottetown. Three months imprisonment.

Isiah Enman, for stealing three green hides, from the Mill of Mr. William Acorn in Lot 49. Three months imprisonment.

Margaret Dalton and Patrick Slattery, against whom no bills had been found, were then placed at the bar and discharged by Proclamation.

On Wednesday last a detachment of 64 men, of the 52d. Regt. and 7 of the Royal Artillery, under the command of Capt. Forrester of the 52d., arrived here from Halifax, via Pictou, to relieve the party of Rifles and Royal Artillery who have been stationed here for nearly two years past, and who embarked on board the St. George, steamer, the day following, for Pictou, en route to Halifax. They were accompanied by Capt. Capel and Lieutenant Atchinson, of the Rifles.

H. M. S. Scylla, 16, now on this station, is one of the old class sloops of 385 tons; and has a complement of 86 officers and seamen, 20 marines, and 24 boys. She is barque rigged.

Mr. L. Y. Nash is appointed Barrack-Master and store-keeper at Prince Edward Island, vice Holland.—English Paper.

On the 25th ult. the Rev. James Waddell, formerly of this Island, who had received an unanimous call from the Presbyterian congregation at River John, Nova Scotia, was inducted in due form to his pastoral charge.

TOBACCO MANUFACTORY.—We noticed in our last that a Tobacco Manufactory was about to be established in Charlottetown, to which we have now to add, that it is already in active operation. In allusion to our remarks, the "Gazette" of Tuesday last says:—

"We agree with our contemporary, that every encouragement should be given to home manufactures, and this was doubtless the view taken by the Legislature during the last Session, when the duty on the manufactured article was doubled, the raw material remaining as before, by which, therefore, the protection is already guaranteed. We have been apprized, also, that a second establishment of the same kind is immediately to go into operation, and thus a better article is likely to be secured to the consumer. We hail with pleasure the introduction of any source of wealth to the community, as home manufacture must evidently be to us, dependent as we are, and are likely to be, upon our own resources, and we consider everything which tends to the consumption of produce, and to the retention of money in the country, a source of wealth."

TEMPERANCE SOIREES.—On the 1st inst., the Auxiliary Temperance Society entertained a number of their friends at Brighton, the beautiful Farm of Mr. George Beer, jun., a short distance from Charlottetown. Although the evening turned out excessively wet, and the tables had to be removed into a building in course of erection on the premises, upwards of a hundred persons partook of an excellent Tea, provided for the occasion, and passed a very agreeable evening.

Yesterday afternoon the Independent Temperance Society had a Tea party at the same place, which was very numerous and respectfully attended. An abundant supply had been provided for three or four hundred persons, and the arrangements generally displayed great taste and ingenuity.

THE WEATHER.—For the last fortnight—after a long continuance of dry weather—great quantities of rain have fallen, in consequence of which a return to the parlour fire-side—though the middle of July—has frequently, of late, been anything but disagreeable. The crops generally have, however, we believe, been much benefited by these copious rains, and now only require the genial influence of the sun, and the lapse of a few weeks, to bring them to maturity.

SHIP NEWS.

Arrived on Tuesday morning, H. M. surveying vessel *Gulnare*, from the Eastward. Sailed, on Thursday, H. M. S. *Scylla*, Commander Sharpe, on a cruise.

H. M. S. *Illustrious* arrived at Havana on the 23d June, from Halifax, via Jamaica.

The Schooner *Elizabeth*, Macdonald, Master, of Georgetown, was upset in a squall off the East Point of this Island on Saturday, the 6th inst. The crew, four in number, got on the bottom of the Vessel, and were relieved from their perilous situation by an American Schooner, which afterwards landed them at Souris.

QUEBEC, June 24.—The Bark *Crusader*, Capt. Wheatley, which cleared from this port for London, on the 4th November last, with a general cargo, and of which nothing had been heard of since, has a length been accounted for. Mr. Edward Hammet, who has just arrived from the coast of Labrador, reports that the above vessel was cast away about the 12th November last, at the Cape Wapitigene, and it is to be feared, every soul on board has perished. Three dead bodies were found this spring on an island near the place, one of them with a fine linen shirt on. Last fall, a boat was seen by some Indians, with five persons in it, off Kakontchou, but was not seen for several miles on either side. Mr. Hammet states that it is to be much regretted that it is not generally known to masters of vessels who pass through the Straits of Belle-Isle, that the coast is inhabited, and that that is the second time that wrecks have perished from hunger and cold, when they might have been saved if they had landed and sought out their inhabitants. The *Crusader* was wrecked within three leagues of inhabitants, either way, who would have received them with open arms. The Indians are remarkably kind, and there is nothing to be apprehended from them.

JUNE 26.—The schooner *Adelaide*, Capt. Fortier, has arrived from Labrador with a part of the materials and 17 barrels of ashes, saved from the wreck of the *Crusader*. Captain Fortier reports that the wreck was visited by a fishing schooner, about the 18th December last, and robbed of everything that was valuable, that they could carry away, and that it was not until some time in the month of March that Mr. Hammet discovered the wreck, and saved the materials above stated. The bottom of the wreck was completely gone; some of the deals were which was on the hull set on fire, just before Capt. Fortier left, which is supposed the 9th inst. One of the three bodies found on the shore and posed to be Capt. Wheatley's, from the fineness of the hair, the clothing. The report of the five men being seen in the boat, Capt. F. thinks incorrect; and says that the vessel must have gone ashore in a dreadful gale of wind, as her sails were close reefed. [This is the week which was fallen in with by Mr. Braddock, of this Island, in his sealing schooner *Harp*, on the 14th of May last.]
