The upstairs portion of the dwelling was the most severely damaged and many household articles were ruined.

Believed to have started near the fire, the upstairs and roof were a mass of flames when the firemen arrived on the scene at approximately 12:15 p.m. and after a short time succeeded in bringing the blaze under control.

The fire again came to life at approximately 3.30 p.m. and this time firemen fought the blaze for almost an hour. They were called back to the dwelling at 11 p.m. when the fire was starting to burn brightly again.

Alfred Mr. Webster was at home when the fire started. It was discovered by Mrs. Webster when she returned from a neighbor's.

Last night the MacLeans spent the night at their son's residence nearby while Mr. Webster moved in with Walter MacLeod.

## Impaired Driver Fined \$150 In City Magistrate's Court

LONDON (Reuters) — Soviet astronomers have discovered that the surface temperature of Venus is about 270 degrees Fahrenheit. This is the first direct measurement—rather than a deduction from the absence of life on the planet, it is confirmed by the Soviet scientist Vali Fesenkov's disclosure in an interview with the Russian news agency Tass. He said the temperatures on Venus were recorded by radio-astronomical observations.
