Lessons of the Exhibition.

EXHIBITIONS would be of no practical value whatever, if they were not distinctly educational. What, then, are the lessons to be drawn from the Provincial Exhibition of 1892?

It was remarked by more than one person in attendance, that the quality of our black oats, particularly, has not improved in recent years, notwithstanding all the efforts which have been put forth to obtain improved seed.

It is disgraceful to Prince Edward Island, in view of the fruit on exhibition, that any of its people should be compelled to import and eat Nova Scotian culls—the little and worm-eaten outcasts of cargoes selected for the British market.

It may be difficult to compete with the farmers of the Western provinces in respect to cattle for export. But in respect to butter and cheese, the products of such cows, we ought certainly to compete successfully with the farmers of Ontario or any other part of America.

In this connection, notice ought to be taken of the failure of our government to redeem their promise to supply a travelling dairy for the special instruction of our farmers and their wives.

The operation of a travelling dairy has resulted in such an improvement of the butter of Denmark that Denmark has profited to the extent of millions of dollars a year.

The great lessons of the exhibition of 1892 are (1) that we should grow less oats and produce more of the improved varieties of fruit suitable for the market abroad;

—The Canadian correspondence of the Dublin Irish Times of the 17th inst., contains the following: By a coincidence Mr. Stanhope's accession to the presidency of the Federation League, in succession to Lord Rosebery, is likely to be followed very shortly by what promises to be the strongest Federation "boom" up to the present time.

The Marshal and officer Carter went over to Southport to-day and found the body of the infant, which they brought to town. Miss Munro went over with the officers and pointed out the place where she had left the body.
