ANNULAR ECLIPSE OF THE SUN.

Preparation are being made to take observations of the annular eclipse of the sun, which will take place on July 29. The difference between an annular and a total eclipse is that with the former there remains a ring of light around the margin of the shadow, the result of the moon being nearer to the sun and farther from us than during a total eclipse. The eclipse will be visible as a partial eclipse throughout Canada, the United States, Mexico and the northern part of South America. The path of the annular will begin in the Pacific Ocean, pass across Mexico, Cuba and a few of the Windward Islands, will touch Cape St. Roque and end in the South Atlantic Ocean.
