A LABOR CORP.—A field of a hundred acres of fall wheat, belonging to Bearman, of N. Penn, near Ottawa, is going to turn out about thirty or forty bushels to the acre. It is the largest crop of wheat ever raised on one farm in the Ottawa Valley.

HEAVY FAILURE.—Duncan Sherman & Co., the great New York Bankers, suspended on Tuesday morning last, causing great excitement in Wall street.

THE REVENUE of this port for July is \$21,406.86, being an increase over the same month in 1874 of \$7,006.47, and more than double the receipt of July, 1873.

PERSONAL.—The Right Hon. Mr. Childers, his wife, and Mr. Charles Childers, arrived in Charlottetown on Wednesday evening last. Mr. and Mrs. Childers are guests of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor.—R. R. Fitzgerald, Esq., S. J. Magistrate, and wife, arrived here on Friday.

A SEA MONSTER.—On Thursday, the 22nd inst., while Mr. John Pidgeon and a boy were fishing mackerel off New London, a monster fish followed a mackerel on Mr. Pidgeon's line, and bit it off. The impetus of the great fish was such that he emerged from the water, flying completely over the boat striking Mr. Pidgeon a severe blow on the left shoulder, and in his passage over also struck the opposite gunwale of the boat, carrying the whole side with him as he again took the water, leaving scales behind him about the size of a ten cent piece. Luckily there was another boat in the vicinity which rescued Mr. Pidgeon and the monster which weighed several hundred pounds, but the suddenness of the attack and its termination, rendered Mr. Pidgeon unable to obtain anything like an accurate description of the great fish. Mr. Pidgeon's arm is greatly swollen, but the injury will not be permanent. We have the foregoing from a reliable gentleman who resides in New London, and who saw the boat after it was towed ashore.

Since the above was in type we learn that the same fish interfered with the fishing boat of Mr. John McLeod, of New London, and stripped all the lines. This was subsequent to the attack on Mr. Pidgeon's boat. It is supposed that the belligerent monster was an enormous Horse Mackerel. Preparations are being made to capture him.—Times.

THE HEROISM.—Heroes are found in every day life as well as in the scenes which thrill the world. One of these lives in Charlottetown, and his name is Patrick Haney. On Saturday night he was a passenger on the Carleton ferry boat at the time of her 10 o'clock trip, from the city side. A large number of persons were on board, and as the boat neared the Carleton floats, the crowd, as usual, pressed forward to jump on the floats at the earliest moment. When the boat was about three feet from the floats the crowd surged forward, the result being that a young woman named Casey, who lives near the old fort, was pushed off the end of the boat and fell into the water. In the darkness and confusion there seemed no hope that she could be rescued. The lantern brought to the spot showed only the black waters of the harbor and the foam which the steamer dashed into the slip. The girl had disappeared, no one knew whether. But there was one person who would not have her perish, and that was Haney. Quick as thought he leaped into the water, and dived into the black waters. Taking another breath, he again surfaced downwards, and under the floats, where the undertow had borne her, found the girl who but for him had perished. It required all his strength to drag her from the position in which she was placed, but he succeeded, and brought her to the surface, when, by the aid of a life buoy he sustained himself and his charge until both could be taken from the water. The young woman was still conscious, and little the worse of her adventure. Her narrow escape from death is due solely to the true heroism of young Haney, who without hesitation risked his own life to save a fellow being from death.—St. John Telegraph.

Intelligence is received of the wreck of the ship "Stuart Hamilton," and loss of about 600 lives, on the 14th of April, in a voyage from Bombay.

There is a monastery in Turkey inhabited by twenty three monks, who have not seen a woman since infancy, and one of them died of what women is like.

To Rest.—Dr. Pusey, the eminent ritualistic divine of England, has been ordered by his physician to take entire rest for a season on account of the injurious effect upon his health of his many labors.

Samuel White, a farmer of Ludlow, Mass., was one of the beasts confined there. A large and very savage bear attacked him without warning, and a desperate encounter ensued, the man striking with a heavy club, with which he armed himself by chopping a log, and the bear biting with deadly effect. At length a deep bite in White's thigh severed the femoral artery, and he bled to death.

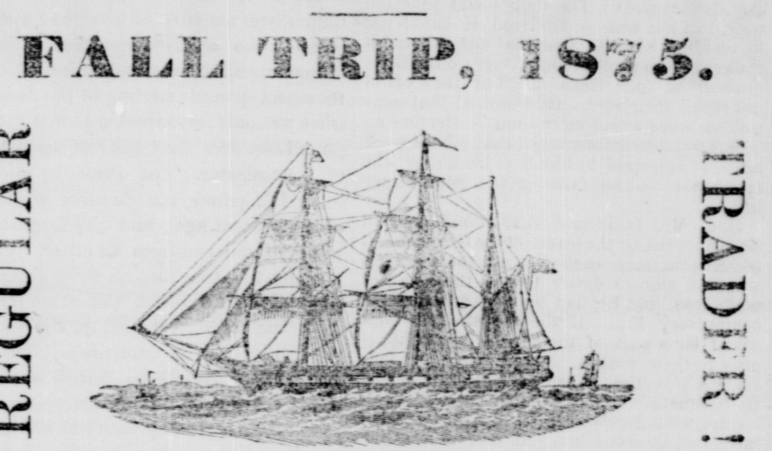
