

More Ore Processing Is Predicted In Canada

The Canadian iron ore industry, created principally as an exporter of raw ore for processing elsewhere, is moving to a stage where more and more of the processing will take place before it leaves the country.

This arises mainly from the demand of the United States and overseas steel industries for higher-grade ores in order to cut costs.

It works to the benefit of the Canadian industry in two ways. It creates more employment in Canada in connection with established operations and opens the way for development of lower-grade ores and their upgrading (beneficiation) on the spot.

M. S. Fotheringham, president of Steep Rock Mines Ltd., located at Steep Rock Lake in northwestern Ontario, draws attention to the development in a review of the iron-ore outlook. He says:

"Canadian iron ore producers rate recognition today both as a primary industry and as one increasingly involved in processing its own raw materials."

industry for greater operating efficiency. As a result 1962 buyer demand will range from top-quality natural ores to tailored ores and pellets."

ADDED TO PLANTS

In regard to his own company, he said:

"Steep Rock, starting with direct shipping ore, was able to add plants for treated ores at relatively low capital cost."

He also stated that important technological advances in mining, particularly underground, are in the offing at Steep Rock. He added:

"Steep Rock in 1961 completed one of the world's largest dredging jobs during which 100,000-000 cubic feet of fill and gravel overburden were removed from the bottom of Steep Rock Lake over a period of nine years."

"The overburden with depths up to 200 feet overlaid the Steep Rock ore deposits and with its removal the further expansions of two operating mines and the bringing into production of a third mine now is possible."

SILVER DOLLARS PROVE POINT

PRATTSBURG, N.Y. (AP) — Ward McConnell wanted to prove how important his farm equipment company was to this village of 700. So he paid his 35 workers in silver dollars for four weeks.

The pay envelopes created some heavy problems, notably for the McConnell Manufacturing Company's payroll clerk. It took her three hours every payday to make up the silver-dollar payroll. The job usually takes 15 minutes.

The president of the local bank complained that the big coins wouldn't work in the bank's coin machines or currency trays.

A grocer lugged a 15-pound bag of silver dollars to the bank and had to struggle to get it through the night deposit slot.

But McConnell thinks he proved that most of the payroll stays in the community.

"At least we had some fun and our pockets were heavy for a time," he said.

Airline Growth Slows But New Surge Expected

MONTREAL (CP) — Airline growth faltered in 1961 but is expected to increase in 1962, Sir William Hildred, director-general of the International Air Transport Association, said Thursday.

Cargo figures in 1961 met expectations but a six-per-cent increase in the number of passengers carried was short of forecasts, he said in a year-end statement.

Probe Planned Of Provisions For Pedestrians

OTTAWA (CP) — The Canadian Automobile Association announced Friday it will make a third annual survey to evaluate what Canadian cities are doing to make life less hectic for pedestrians.

Cities with populations of more than 10,000 will be provided with forms on which they will enter deaths and injuries to pedestrians, traffic legislation, enforcement and engineering, school and traffic safety and public information on traffic control.

Fish Landings Down In Nfld.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Total fish landings in Newfoundland during 1961 were estimated at 502,000,000 pounds, about 12 per cent less than in 1960, the federal fisheries department said Friday.

In a year-end statement released by Newfoundland Director H. R. Bradley, cod landings were estimated at 328,000,000 pounds, compared with 406,000,000 in 1960. Salt fish production was the lowest since 1958.

There was a slight increase in the number of fishermen, including 14,200 fulltime inshore fishermen.

PM Installs Seat Belts

OTTAWA (CP) — Prime Minister Diefenbaker is getting seat belts installed in his car but the federal government apparently is not prepared to endorse the safety measure officially.

News of the prime minister's intention to use the belts when he goes out driving was disclosed Friday by Arch Bryce, executive director of the Canadian Highway Safety Council.

Mr. Bryce, saying a Saskatchewan survey showed that seat belts cut down fatalities by one-third, added that Finance Minister Fleming and Health Minister Monteith now use them.

The federal government, however, will go only as far as promising a review of the question in answer to a request for "early installation" of safety belts in government-owned vehicles.
