SHARP DROP IN N. Y. STOCKS

NEW YORK, April 18 —(AP)—The stock market suffered a severe sinking-spell today that reached an acute stage in mid-session. The setback was equal to the heaviest of the year, and at one time the high-speed ticker tape was unable to keep pace with transactions on the exchange floor.

The fall included oils, rails, coppers, motors, and rubbers. Just before the close there was a good recovery among heavy losers. Amerasia lost as much as 8 points at 219 (at one time a sale showing a loss of 10 points was cancelled), but it recovered and closed with a gain of 1 3-4 at 228 3-4.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks lost \$1.40 at \$100.30. A similar fall was registered Feb. 19, but there has not been a greater decline in the average since last Oct. 27.

Volume came to 1,720,000 shares. Stocks declining were Northern Pacific off 3 7-8 at 81 3-4, Atlantic Coast Line, Union Pacific, Rohm & Haas, St. Louis Southwestern, Standard Oil (N.J.), Cities Service, Kennecott Copper, U. S. Steel, General Motors, U. S. Rubber and Boeing.

results were noted:
1. Use of an artificial kidney is feasible for removal of specific diffusible substances from the blood.

2. The result can be achieved without excess hazard to the patient.

3. The procedure can be repeated if necessary.

4. Its use should not be postponed until it is a last resort because other methods have failed.

5. In addition to nitrogen metabolites (leftover substances from the body's action on nitrogenous substances) which may be toxic in high concentration sodium, potassium, calcium and water can also be removed selectively. In patients in whom mineral substances are not in sufficient amounts in the blood, these substances may be restored without addition of other electrolyte (substances decomposed by electricity or water.)

Methods of controlling toxicity of the bath fluid added greatly to the efficacy and safety of the procedure and widened its use to the point where it was possible to use it without difficulty on a child aged three and one half," the doctors stated.

Clinical conditions in which the artificial kidney may be of value are acute anuria (inability to pass urine), too much calcium in the blood, chronic condition of blood in the urine, hypotremia (not enough sodium in the blood) hypernatremia (too much sodium in the blood), shocklike states and congestive heart failure, and water (edema) in the chest cavity.

From the above we learn something of the importance of the kidneys in selecting materials from the blood, the materials that are helpful to the body's needs and the materials that can be harmful if not removed.
