U. S. Control Over Industry In Canada Reported Increasing

OTTAWA (CP)—United States control over Canadian industry increased in the first half of 1957 as Canada chalked up new deficits in her foreign trade of goods and services.

With imports continuing to race ahead of exports, Canada showed an adverse balance of \$1,003,000,000 in trade with the U.S. during the January-June period, up from \$941,000,000 in the first half of 1956 and one of the highest deficits in post-war years.

Meanwhile, Canada's traditional surplus in trade with Britain continued to shrink, dropping to \$52,000,000 from \$103,000,000 in the half-year.

This left Canada with an overall world deficit for the six months of a record \$914,000,000, up from \$796,000,000 last year, the bureau of statistics reported

Tuesday.

All this had a pronounced impact on Canada's foreign debt and American control over Canadian development. All of the deficit was financed by imports of capital, adding to the huge amounts already put to work in this country.

10 BILLION

The bureau of statistics estimated that by mid-1957 total foreign capital left Canada with a balance of indebtedness to other countries of more than \$10,000,000,000, compared with \$9,500,000,000 at the end of 1956.

A big chunk of this was in the hands of Americans. The book value of foreign investments in Canada stood at \$15,400,000,000 at the end of 1956. Of this total, more than \$11,600,000,000 was owned in the U.S., \$2,700,000,

000 in Britain and \$1,100,000 in other countries mainly Western Europe.

The amount of American investment in Canada and the policies of some of the big American corporations operating in Canada have been of particular concern to the Progressive Conservative government.

Prime Minister Diefenbaker said Saturday at Dartmouth College Hanover, N.H., that Canada welcomes this American investment and intends to "provide the best foreign investment climate in the world." But Canadians wanted these foreign operations in Canada opened to Canadian investors.

IMPORTS AND EXPORTS

Canada's foreign trade in goods and services covers imports and exports of commodities as well as transactions in shipping costs, tourist trade and the movement of interest and dividends.

Overall exports of goods in January-June made only a tiny gain, to \$2,315,000,000 from \$2,314,000,000. This included ship-

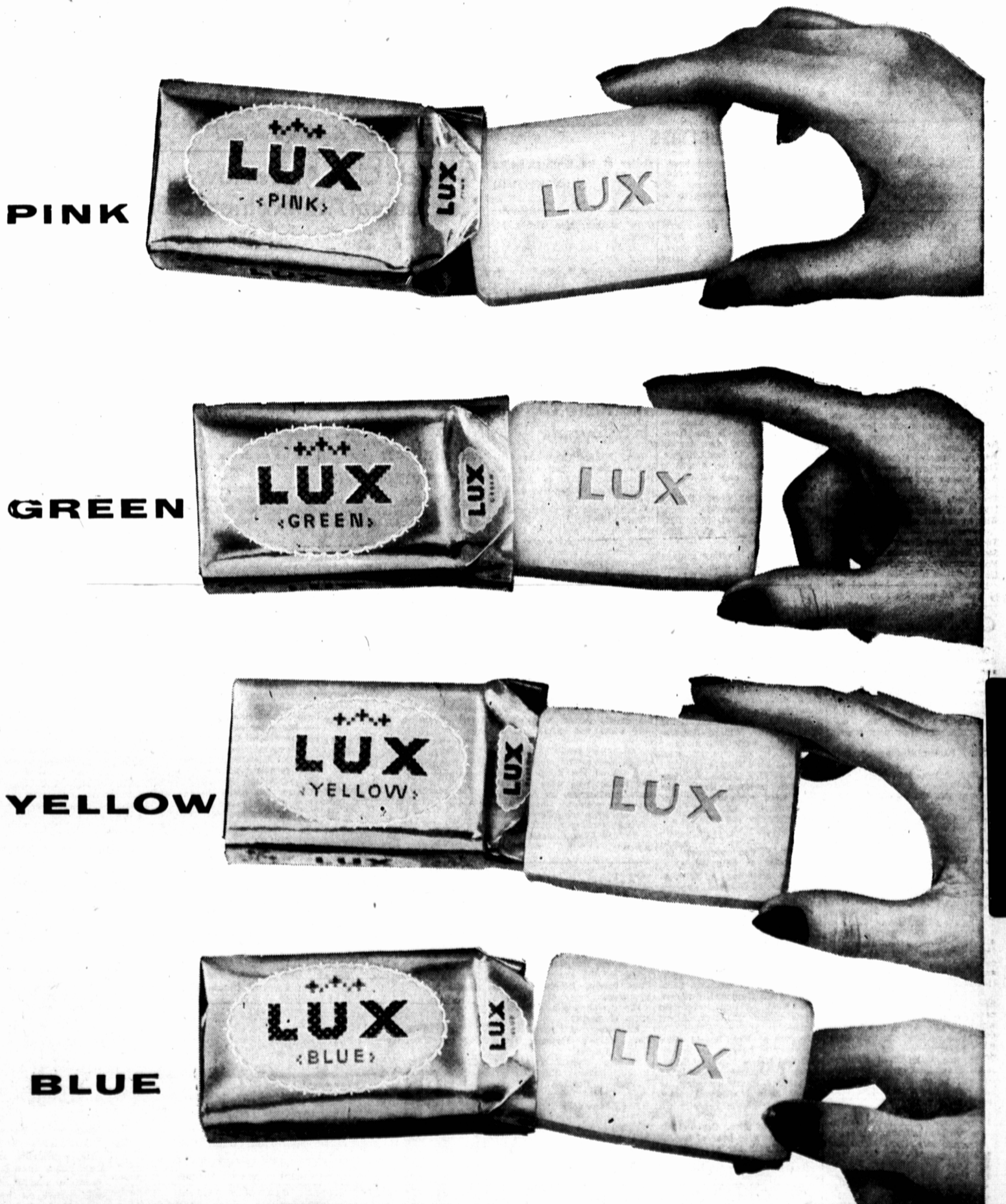
