# P.E.I. Glaucoma Screening Clinics To Be Organized By Lions Clubs

Representatives of the nine Lions clubs in this province met at the Charlottetown Hotel, Saturday afternoon to organize and implement the holding of blind glaucoma screening clinics in a united effort to further their sight conservation program on a provincial scale.

Glaucoma is one of the most common causes of blindness in adults, affecting approximately one person in 50 over the age of 40 years, and is responsible for an estimated 12 per cent of the world's blindness. Fortunately, if the disease can be discovered before severe damage has occurred, and if proper treatment is instituted, blindness can be prevented, it was stated.

Chaired the organization at a meeting, Deputy District Governor Joseph Molloy of the Charlottetown club, stated that "the purpose of the Lions glaucoma screening clinics, is to provide an opportunity for the people of this province, over the age of 40, to take a test free of charge, to ascertain whether or not they have glaucoma."
