

French Frigate Arrives In Port

The French Naval frigate "L'Aventure" arrived in port yesterday morning and is docked at the Railway Wharf where she is scheduled to remain until Monday morning.

The frigate is commanded by Commander M. Hiribarren and carries a complement of 123 men, including ten officers and 29 petty officers. Capt. J. J. Connolly and Lt.-Cmdr. J. N. Kenny of the Charlottetown Command were visitors aboard the L'Aventure shortly after her arrival in port.

Following the visit, Commander Hiribarren made official calls on Lieut. Governor T. W. L. Frowse, Premier W. Matheson and Mayor J. D. Stewart. Return visits were made by the officials yesterday afternoon.

A reception was held last evening at the HMCS "Queen Charlotte" in honour of the Commanding Officer and officers of the visiting ship.

On Thursday there will be a Lieutenant-Governor's ball in honour of the captain and officers, and on Friday two smokers will be held for the officers and crew. On Saturday and Sunday afternoons the "L'Aventure" will be open to the public between the hours of two and five p.m.

IN MEMORIAM

DONALD ALEXANDER MacFADYEN

Mr. Don A. MacFadyen passed peacefully away on March 10 at 62 Great George Street, Charlottetown, at the age of 70 years. He was born on November the 30th, 1884, at Augustine Cove, the son of Neil Finley and Annie Gillis MacFadyen. For many years he was a successful and prosperous farmer at Augustine Cove and enjoyed the respect of a host of friends in the area. He was married in 1906 to Miss Frances Amelia MacDonald of Crapaud, who survives him. There remains also a sister, Mrs. Frank Dixon of North Tryon.

Mr. MacFadyen was a believer in Christ and early in life publicly professed faith in Him as Saviour and Lord. He knew the keeping power of the Rosin Mediator who enabled him to lead a life of purity and uprightness.

His final illness, a time testing lasted two years, during which he never complained, but resigned himself to the hands of his Maker. He was frequently comforted by the visits of many friends and faithful ministers.

The funeral was held on Sunday, March 14, from the residence of Mrs. Edward MacFadyen, Augustine Cove. It was largely attended, showing the esteem of the departed in the minds of many people. Service was conducted by Rev. Lloyd Archer of Tryon, assisted by Rev. Quincy Stairs of Charlottetown, Mrs. John Haslam and Mrs. Hedley Lowther sang very effectively "Going Down the Valley One by One."

Burial was at Crapaud Cemetery.

COURT RULES In Language Case; Man's Job Saved

TORONTO (CP)—A supreme court justice has given a legal definition of a vulgar expression which usually is shortened to two initials.

Mr. Justice Wilfred D. Roach of the Ontario Supreme Court said in a recent arbitration board ruling—

as most everyone except cows has long imagined—that the words mean "insensate, you're all wrong."

As a result of the definition, a man's job was saved. The language case, it was ruled, is not always the language of Sunday schools.

The board's decision arose from an incident at Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company in suburban North York. A foreman accused tire builder John Ross of being absent from his machine for a half hour. Ross denied it and replied with the expletive in its fullest form of impoliteness.

EMPLOYEE FIRED
He was fired. The foreman wrote on Ross's employment card: "Using obscene language to supervisor." The United Rubber Workers of America (CIO-CCL) fought it. It was the first grievance at Goodyear in six years to go as far as arbitration.

The majority report ruled that the expression was not lewd or obscene. Nor was it a curse. It was merely vulgar. It carried the meaning, "nonsense, you're all wrong."

The board said: "We think we should be realistic and give effect to the plain fact that workmen in industry, some more than others, are not sufficiently careful in the language they use."

Ross was ordered reinstated.

Mrs. Petrov Tells Of Life As Soviet Spy Before Commission On Espionage

MELBOURNE (Reuters)—Mrs. Evdokia Petrov, 40-year-old wife of former Russian embassy official Vladimir Petrov, took the witness stand before the royal commission on espionage for the first time Tuesday to tell of her own life as a Soviet secret agent.

Emerging from 11 weeks in hiding in Sweden, she described her task in Australia of looking for likely prospects for Soviet espionage service. She studies prospects at embassy and private receptions, and then reported to Moscow when she found potential recruits.

Mrs. Petrov wore her hair cut short and curled off the neck. Apart from a touch of coral lipstick, she wore no makeup. In the courtroom, were on the pale-complexioned woman as she testified in a soft, slightly-accented voice.

THREATENED SUICIDE
Largely corroborating her husband's testimony of life and work in Sweden, she testified that she had the task of discovering if there was any anti-Soviet feeling among Russians living near Spitzbergen.

Petrov told the commission Tuesday that after seeking political asylum in Australia last April, he wrote to the Russian embassy saying he was "obliged to end his life."

He said the letter, written as a pretence to explain his absence from the embassy, accused the ambassador and his staff of reducing him and his wife to a bundle of nerves by "lies, slanders and untruths."

LONDON (Reuters)—A German contribution to the Atlantic pact forces is "almost essential" if NATO territory, which includes West Germany, is to be defended, Lord Ismay, NATO secretary-general, said here Monday. He said a German contribution is necessary because the range of modern weapons requires defence in great depth.

Variety Of Problems Discussed Last Night At Agriculture Federation Meeting

That agricultural earnings represented one of the weakest points in the economy of Canada was emphasized last night by Mr. Walter R. Shaw, former Deputy Minister of Agriculture, when he briefly addressed the semi-annual meeting of the Queen's County Federation of Agriculture held at Birch Court.

Though he did not elaborate on the subject, Mr. Shaw said the country was facing one of the most serious periods in history. He expressed the opinion that a high price for wheat to the Western farmer was a good thing as it meant that the Eastern buyer could obtain better prices for his products.

FARM LOANS
There was some discussion on the matter of farm loans with the general opinion being the present system of Government loans was not satisfactory. Some members expressed wonderment that immigrants could come to the Province and in the space of two or three years be able to purchase farms of their own. They maintained that young island farmers could not do so and wondered where the financial assistance was coming from.

One of the resolutions expressed appreciation to the Government for assistance rendered in the potato industry through the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board and suggested that effective action be taken to further protect the industry in the coming marketing season. The marketing of turnips was also under discussion with the feeling prevailing that since this controlled the market they should get together and have someone here to explain to the intricate details of marketing the product.
