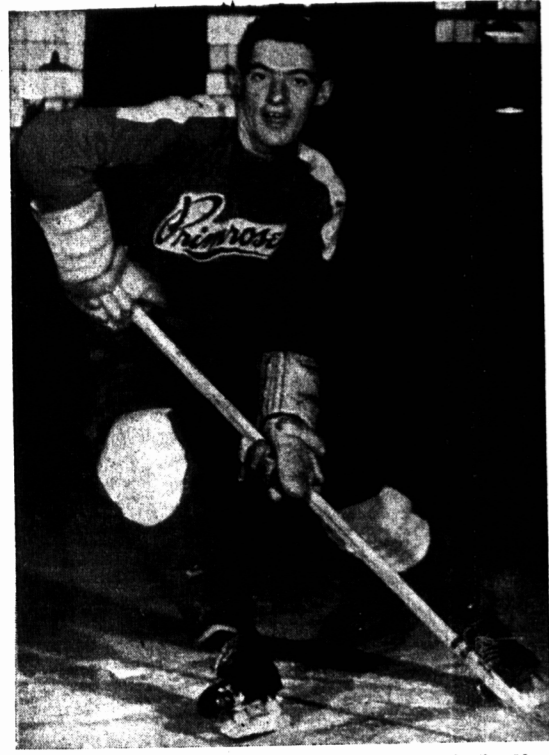


Arsenault, McGee Pace Win

Above are Phil (Fibber) McGee and Bill Hughes who were two important cogs in the Montague Aces' victory over the Primroses last night.

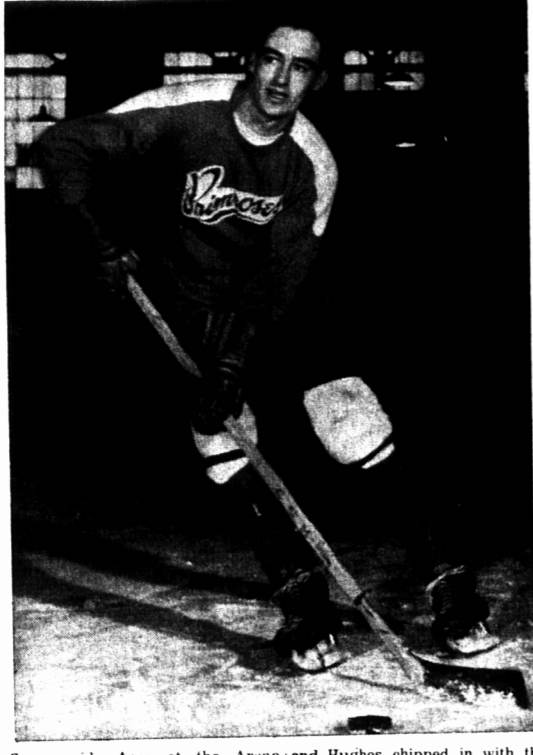
Apprs Arsenault fired three goals and teammate Phil McGee notched a pair to lead Montague Primroses to an 8-2 victory over Summerside Aces in a regular game of the Island Senior "B" League at the Sports Arena last night.

Arsenault shot one in the second and two in the third for his hat trick while McGee got the Montague club off to a good start with two consecutive first-period goals.

Dave MacLeod, Flick Landry and George MacDonald were the other Montague marksmen while Vance Harris and Neil Walker scored for the Aces.

A total of 21 penalties were called in the rather rugged game. Summerside were awarded 11 of them one a major to defenseman Ron MacArthur for fighting in the third period.

Montague were leading 3-0 at the end of the first period as a result of McGee's pair of goals and MacLeod's single. MacLeod and McGee teamed up for the first

side could get on the score-sheet. Vance Harris finally broke the goose-egg when he slapped in Schurman's rebound from directly in front of the goal at 5:15. As in the first period neither team gave much thought to defensive hockey but again erratic shooting and poor passing, especially on the part of the Aces, kept the scoresheet clean for the remaining minutes.

MacArthur and Reeves of the Aces and McGee of Montague each picked up a pair of minor penalties during the period while Carroll and Landry of the Primroses and Paul Schurman sat out minors. Reeves and MacArthur were sent off only seconds apart in the dying seconds of the period and as a result Montague were two men up when the third opened.

ARSENAULT SCORES TWO
With a two-man advantage Montague wasted little time in putting on the pressure and Apprs Arsenault made it 6-1 on a shot from the corner after taking passes from Hughes and Carroll. Neil Walker was the man at the right spot for the Aces at the 5:43 mark, whacking in Harris' rebound. Schurman also drew an assist and as in the first Aces' goal Ward had practically no chance at all.

It was Arsenault again for Montague at 11:09 and George MacDonald rounded out the scoring when he took a pass from Dick Carroll immediately following a face-off in the Summerside zone and drove a hot one behind Gamble.

Harlem. "Who ever thought this would happen? This is really something! You don't look forward to this three times—not even twice. Getting it only once is quite an accomplishment.

I've got to thank my teammates for this. Playing on a great team helps and we had a great man. Playing on a lesser team makes it harder to win."

Campy's eighth year in the league was one of his best, and according to Roy, his "most satisfying" because it came after his wretched season the year before. In 1954 he was hampered by a broken left hand and finished with his poorest season with a woeful .207 batting mark. Campy's slump was felt by the Dodgers, who finished second to the Giants in '54.

He underwent two operations to relieve the pressure of a nerve that had been causing partial paralysis of the left hand and came back with a roar. He caught 125 games, hit .318, drove in 107 runs and hammered 26 home runs.

Noses Out Duke Snider

Roy Campanella Voted Most Valuable Player

NEW YORK (AP)—Catcher Roy Campanella, who made a tremendous comeback to lead Brooklyn Dodgers to another pennant and their first world series victory, Thursday was named the National League's most valuable player for 1955.

By the narrow margin of five points the stocky, 34-year-old receiver nosed out teammate Duke Snider—226 to 221—to become the second player in league history to win the prized award three times.

Stan Musial, the great St. Louis Cardinal outfielder, received the honor in 1943, 1946 and 1948. Campanella won it previously in 1951 and 1953.

Only two other players ever won this distinction more than once, Rogers Hornsby in 1925 and 1929 and Carl Hubbell in 1933 and 1936.

CATCHERS TOPS

It's All-Or-Nothing For Ray Robinson Tonight

CHICAGO (AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson's comeback reaches the all-or-nothing stage tonight when the former welterweight and middleweight champ faces Bob Olson, current middleweight king, in a 15-round title match at Chicago Stadium.

Although 35-year-old Sugar Ray is a dancing dandy in his heyday may be the sentimental favorite to those who fondly recall his boxing skill, the hard money in the betting markets has made Olson a 3-to-1 choice. If Robinson wins, he'll be the first ever to recapture the 160 pound title twice.

Because Robinson is on display and a title hangs in the balance, the radio-television sponsors are coughing up \$75,000 so that the bout may be heard and seen on network broadcasts. Chicago and a 150-mile area, however, will be blacked out on TV to help the gate. The fight starts at 10 p.m. EST (8 p.m. MST). The fight will be carried by radio coast-to-coast on the CBC Dominion network and on the eastern Canada TV network.

OLSON COOLING OFF
Truman Gibson, secretary of the promoting International Boxing Club, talks of a crowd of 12,000 and a gate of \$150,000. More conservative estimates put the crowd figure at 9,000 and the gate at about \$100,000.

Olson gets 35 per cent, five per cent under the usual champion's cut, and Robinson gets 25 per cent of gate receipts and television money. If Robinson wins, there is a reported rematch clause for a return bout within 90 days.

Until the 27-year-old Olson ventured out of his class to box Arcone Moore for the light-heavy crown last June 18, he was becoming a superstar with the TV audiences. When Moore stopped him in three rounds he became an ordinary mortal. In two starts since the Moore knockout, Olson has not been sensation. After a performance against Jimmy Martinez, he was hard pressed to win over Joey Giambra Aug. 26, his last outing. Both were non-title matches. Worsley Fights Jacques Plante For Efficiency
NEW YORK (CP)—Montreal's Jacques Plante was a bit stingier but New York's Lorne Worsley was a lot busier last week as the two continued a tight race at the top of the efficiency ratings for National Hockey League goaltenders.

The steady Canadian netminder gave up one goal in each of his games during the week while blocking 68 of the 71 shots fired at him for a 95.8 average. That boosted his season's record two points from the previous week to 939.

But Worsley stayed just one point behind Plante, even though he let in five tallies to his three. The little Ranger netminder had 108 shots to handle in his three games and stopped 103 for a .954 mark and a 938 record for the year, also a two-point gain.

Terry Sawchuk of Boston added a point to his record, carding a .926 effort for the week and 918 for the year, while Chicago's Al Rollins had a bad week, slipping seven points to .916, and yielded third place to Sawchuk.

Detroit's Glen Hall and Toronto's Harry Lumley each dropped four points to .912 and .903 respectively.
