A VALUABLE CARGO.—The Norwegian brig Medea, which was cleared a few days ago, for London, by L. H. Mathers, takes 10,000 cases of lobsters, and other cargo, making a total value of \$51,215.—Herald.

HON. R. W. SCOTT is now taking out papers for a charter of incorporation for the Grape Sugar Company of Canada. Their head quarters will be at Arthursville. The works of the Company will have a capacity of one thousand bushels of corn per day.

QUITE AN INFLUX.—The St. John Sun of Wednesday says:—"The steamer Falmouth arrived from Boston, yesterday afternoon, with 20 tons freight and 345 passengers."

EFFECTS OF THE LIGHTNING.—The storm of Sunday evening appears to have been especially severe in some parts of this country. A Memramcook correspondent gives an account of the effects of the electric light, which struck the college chapel, tearing off a part of the roof, and injuring the new tower, perhaps quite seriously. The lightning was very vivid in this locality. Mr. C. P. Harris, while driving on the Fox Creek road, was partially stunned, and another man a short distance from him was knocked down. Telegraph poles in the vicinity were shattered.—Moncton Times.

WIMBLEDON.—A special telegram to the Toronto Globe states that "Serg't J. Mitchell, Private Mason, Private Harris, Sergeant Richard, Captain Weston, Captain Thomas, and Private Bent shot grandly in the first range of the Queen's prize. Private C. N. Mitchell has secured a place in the Alfred prize, for which W. J. O'z's score was 25, and Serg't Mitchell's 23. The Canadians are decidedly the attraction, and hundreds have commenced to come down to their camp. The Duke of Cambridge has intimated his intention of visiting the Canadian quarters next week, and the Princess Louise is expected next Tuesday. Sir John Macdonald will go down from New Brunswick on Tuesday or Wednesday. The Canadians speak hopefully of their chances for the Kaapora cup."

THE young Czar's present residence, the Palace of Peterhoff, though pleasantly situated beside the sea and surrounded by a splendid park, is hardly a cheerful place. A ghastly atmosphere hangs about it. The luckless Princess Tarakanova, so runs the local tradition, had her last interview at Peterhoff with her pitiless rival Catherine before her engagement to the dungeon from which she never emerged. At Peterhoff also late Alexander, the eldest daughter of the late Czar, around whose fate some mystery is said to be hanging. Every night to walk and sometimes they weep. The weeping of the ghostly visitants, like the wailing of the banshee, is said to be the sure prognostic of coming death. On the evening of the fatal Sunday when the Czar was slain more than twenty persons declare they saw the Princess weeping.

July 15, 1881. Clippings from Late Papers. Intense heat is reported from all parts of the United States, with numerous cases of sunstroke. Great damage was caused by a storm in Iowa on Saturday night, and some lives were lost. A meeting of the Emperors of Germany and Austria will take place at Salzburg in the middle of August. The handsome sum of \$5,000 has been received by the Mayor from the Quebec fire relief committee of Boston. Lord Salisbury's speech on the sugar duties, recently, is regarded as intended to raise the reciprocity flag. It is reported that the wheat crop in Iowa cannot exceed the average, and may be slightly under it. The best crop cannot exceed the average. A St. Petersburg despatch says the Minister of War has proposed to discontinue the construction of fortifications on the German and Austrian frontiers begun by a former Minister of War, thereby saving ten million roubles in the Budget. THE BULGARIAN ELECTIONS.—A Vienna despatch says:—Although the elections on the whole are favorable to Prince Alexander, the agitation in Bulgaria is very great, and is increasing. A considerable number of Opposition deputies were elected, including the leader. The sudden appearance of the comet caused great consternation among the native population of New Mexico, and their churches have been crowded by frightened men, women and children, praying that the dire calamities they feared might be averted. Adverting to the fact that another "smallest craft that ever attempted to cross the ocean" the New York Herald says:—If some lunatic would only attempt to cross the Atlantic on a plank this most senseless method of courting death might be discouraged.
