



### HUNT FOR YOUNG SEALS OVER, BUT PLANES STILL WAIT

Although the aerial hunt for young white coat seals is over seven planes are still based at Tignish Run and some of these are to be used later this month when the adult seal hunting season opens. Five planes and two helicopters remain based at Montrose Bridge where this photograph was taken at the height of the hunt which ended last Thursday. Alberton hunters are keeping a close watch on the main seal herd which is now located about 36 miles due east of Alberton and still contains many thousands of seals. A hunter said last night that the chances of a land-based hunt from P.E.I. appears slim but that the herd might approach quite close to Cape Breton Island.

# Police Court Has Full Docket

Pleading guilty to a charge of impaired driving, Arnold Bruce Taylor, Millview, was fined \$125 and costs in city police court Saturday morning. He was represented by Lester P. O'Donnell.

On charges of being drunk and incapable one man was remanded to March 15, another to the 17th and a third was sent to jail on a previous commitment.

Unlawful possession of liquor cost a Morell man \$20 and costs and a disorderly conduct charge, fighting on the street, a \$25 fine.

Entering a plea of not guilty to a drunk and disorderly charge a Charlottetown man was found guilty and fined \$20. Another city man on the same charge on remand from March 10 had his case dismissed for want of prosecution when his wife who had made the complaint failed to appear in court.

James Wilbert Rooney, charged with theft under \$50 value and remanded from Friday entered a plea of guilty. He was represented by Gordon Tweedy who pleaded for leniency in suggesting a suspended sentence with regular reports to the provincial probation officer for guidance. Police Chief Stearns Webster entered an objection saying "we have tried guidance ourselves and it failed" and asking imposition of a penalty.

**MORE INFORMATION**

An intimation from the Chief and Court Clerk Bert Campbell that there was more to the case than the current charge of stealing one dollar at the P.E.I. Hospital brought a request for the full story from Magistrate James Haslam, QC.

Sgt. Charles Ready, city police, told of previous complaints from the hospital and investigations which led to questioning of the accused and certain admissions he made then. Later complaints from the hospital administrator led to Sgt. Ready placing some marked money in various places. When a dollar bill was missing it was found in possession of the accused, an orderly there.

The magistrate stated his belief that the accused, a young married man, needed professional guidance and remanded him to Monday to enable him to obtain bond in the amount of \$500, two sureties of \$250 each. It was understood a sentence would be suspended for a period of two years with accused to make periodic visits to the probation officer as dictated by him.

## Ex Islander Is Honored

VANCOUVER (Special) — Sergeant W.D. MacDougall of Vancouver, B.C., and a native of St. Peter's Bay was the recipient of a letter of recognition from Vice Admiral Kenneth L. Dyer, chief of personnel, for his efforts to save the life of a six-year old child who was accidentally shot in the neck last September.

Sgt. MacDougall found the boy in a local rod and gun club when a gun accidentally went off and shot him. The child, who at first showed signs of improving, later died from his gunshot injury.
