GEN. MIDDLETON'S SUCCESSOR.—Colonel Cameron will, it is said, succeed Sir Fred. Middleton in command of the Canadian militia force. Gen. Middleton, who is over age, has been placed on the British army retired list.

THE COBAN.—The Black Diamond Line steamer Coban, Captain Robert Fraser, arrived here from Montreal en route to St. John's, Nfld., at eight o'clock this morning. She carries the usual miscellaneous cargo, and after taking in some island produce will sail for St. John's.

BEATING THE RECORD.—At the Bay District track, San Francisco, Cal., last week, Gov. Stanford's Sable Wilkes, accompanied by a running mate, started to beat the three-year-old record of 2:19 1/2 and succeeded, making the first quarter in 35s., half mile in 1:09, three-quarters in 1:44, and the mile easily in 2:18.

THE BOSTON STEAMER.—The steamer Worcester arrived from Boston last night with the usual general cargo and the following passengers:—Mr. D. Ferguson, Mr. J. McLean, Mrs. Boyle, Mrs. Clair, Miss Waddell, Mr. F. G. Hayden, Miss Ann McDonald. She sails on return at four o'clock to-morrow afternoon.

A METEORIC DEEP.—A big mass, supposed to be a meteoric body, was discovered recently on the farm of John Walsh, near Bear Brook, on the line of the Canadian Atlantic. It weighs several tons and is nearly out of sight. The ground alongside shows signs of disturbance, having been thrown up to a height of several feet.

AN AGED SINNER.—John Miner, of Saratoga, N. Y., seventy-one years of age, was recently sentenced to two years imprisonment for bigamy. It appears that Miner had no less than five wives. He left his first wife several years ago and married another at Plattsburg. A few years ago he married again at Putnam, Washington County, but never lived with wife No. 3. Miner is said to have two more wives, one living at Boston Corners, in New York State, and another at Troy.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT GALE.

Many Wrecks Reported.

Great Damage in England.

LONDON, Nov. 1. A gale prevails throughout England, Telegraph wires are broken, chimneys blown down and trees uprooted. Seven vessels were wrecked at Cardiff and many wrecks are reported at other places. The gale has stopped the races at Brighton.

At 4 p. m. the gale subsiding, the races at Brighton, suspended on account of the storm, were resumed.

The dock and dam at Ardrossan were washed away, also the railway embankment at Holyhead.

A score of vessels in the Mersey broke from their moorings and drifted broadside up the river. There was one serious collision.

NORFOLK, Va., Nov. 1. A storm on Sunday and Monday was most disastrous and damaging. At least fifty vessels are ashore, and many will be total wrecks. No lives are reported lost.

TERRIFIC EXPLOSION.

A Whole Family Blown Up and Killed.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 1. A terrific explosion occurred early this morning in a grocery store here. The grocery and two adjoining brick buildings were totally destroyed, and 12 persons who lived in the houses were buried in the ruins. It is not known how many were killed. The cause of the explosion is a mystery. Some attribute it to the criminal use of dynamite, and others to the accidental explosion of gasoline. The Newman family, consisting of Mr. and Mrs. Newman and five children were all killed. Four other bodies have been recovered. Besides those injured in the building, many persons in the neighborhood were more or less cut and bruised by flying splinters and bricks. For several blocks the concussion shattered windows, and in the immediate vicinity, on the opposite side of the street, the fronts of buildings were smashed in by the terrible force. The financial loss will not exceed \$20,000.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Nov. 1. It is stated that Robert Stewart, representing the New Brunswick Trading Company, is negotiating for the purchase of one of the most valuable lumber mills and limits in the Ottawa Valley. It is understood that Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies has, at the request of the Dominion Government obtained the consent of the War Office to enable Colonel Cameron to take up the duties of Official Secretary to the Canadian Representative, Sir Charles Tupper, at the approaching Fisheries Conference at Washington.

The Grand Trunk Railway have decided to test the system of heating their passenger cars with steam direct from the locomotives and abolishing the stoves.

To Protect British Interests. MONTREAL, Nov. 1. Admiral Henlage left for Victoria, B. C., to-day, to take command of the Pacific squadron. In an interview, he said one of his first official acts would be to visit the Alaskan waters and to protect British interests there. He would not allow British vessels to be molested outside the three mile limit, no matter who attempted it. He understands that the recent seizures in Alaskan waters will form part of the fisheries enquiry. He will make a special report to the British post office department, on the Canadian Pacific Railway, as an imperial route to the East.

Scott Act Fines. ST. THOMAS, Ont., Nov. 1. During the last month the city treasury was enriched by \$1,246 fines in Scott Act cases.

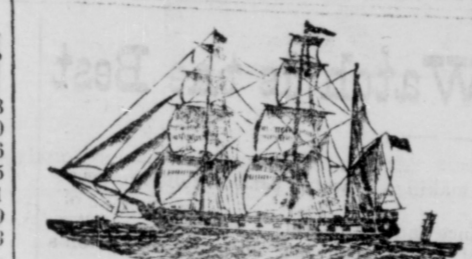
