GOOD TIME ON SKATES. — This forenoon Messrs. J. S. Raymond, Lewis G. Wheat and S. C. Moore skated from Charlottetown to Mount Stewart, a distance of eight or ten miles, in the splendid time of one hour and twenty minutes. They left Charlottetown at 7.15 and arrived at Mount Stewart at 8.35. The ice was in grand condition. This is excellent time, and we would like to hear from anyone beating it.

SCHOOL CONCERT. — The concert given in the schoolhouse at North River last night by the pupils at present under the tuition of Mr. Thomas McLean, was a very pleasant affair, and the manner in which many of the pupils gave their recitations, dialogues and choral songs well for the instruction given by the teacher. The programme was a long one, and all the numbers were received with great applause. Mr. T. A. McLean and Miss Elsie McLean, who were present, favored the audience with two excellent recitations, and Mr. Ernest Peake sang a comic selection, being applauded to respond to the enthusiastic songs given. The room was crowded to the doors, many being present from the city, a large number of whom skated up on the ice at present so good for that pleasant pastime.

Provincial Legislature.

House of Assembly.

SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS.

MONDAY, March 20.

Mr. Underhew presented a bill to incorporate the Red House Branch of the Farmers' and Dairyman's Association of Prince Edward Island. The bill was read a first time.

Hon. Mr. McMillan presented the Report of the Commissioner of Crown and Public Lands.

Hon. Mr. McLean presented the Report of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Mr. Sullivan submitted a bill to incorporate the Head of St. Peter's Bay Dairying Company. The bill was read a first time.

Dr. Jenkins moved that the House go into committee of the whole to consider the necessity of passing a bill to restrict the sale of opium and other drugs. These drugs are soothing, but in the highest degree deleterious when taken. He said that the object of the bill was to prevent the sale of such drugs except by the direction of a medical man. The resolution was reported agreed to, and a bill based thereon submitted and read a first time.

Mr. H. C. McDonald submitted a bill incorporating Elgin's Hall Company, which was read a first time.

The bill to confirm certain deeds and writings was read a third time and passed.

The bill to incorporate the Mount Stewart Dairying Company was read a second time and passed in committee.

House adjourned.

TUESDAY, March 21.

House met at 11.30.

The Act incorporating the Gowan-Brag Dairying Company was read a second time in committee, with Mr. James E. Macdonald in the chair. Bill reported agreed to without amendment.

The bill incorporating the Kensington Hall Dairying Company was read a second time in committee. Mr. McWilliams in the chair, and reported agreed to without amendment.

A special meeting of the City Council was called by the Mayor yesterday afternoon in response to two resolutions, the contents of which have already been made public through THE EXAMINER. All the Councillors were in their places. After the Mayor had read the resolutions calling the meeting and explained the order in which they were received and attended to.

Councillor Crabb moved that Councillors Crabb, Hogan and McKay be the Finance Committee of the Council. Seconded by Councillor Beer.

Councillor Taylor said the resolution was out of order, and claimed that as their requisition had been received first the business mentioned therein should be first disposed of.

A somewhat heated discussion then took place on the question as to what business should take precedence. It was, however, decided to go ahead with the business specified in the requisition sent in by Councillors Crabb, Hogan and McKay, and as Councillors Taylor, Robertson and Hooper were leaving the chamber (Councillor Hughes was already outside) the resolution appointing the Finance Committee was put and declared carried.

At the retiring councillors were in the clerk's office putting on their coats, the Mayor read the rule providing that "no member of the Council shall leave the chamber without permission of the Mayor, and if they do so they lie under a vote of censure," and directed the Clerk to make a record on his minutes of the fact that Councillors Hughes, Taylor, Robertson and Hooper, had gone away from the meeting in direct violation of this rule.

While waiting for the hour prescribed by law to elapse before the meeting adjourned, Mayor Haviland explained that previous to the meeting, the four councillors who had retired had called at his office and had tried to make him give them a pledge that he would give the business contained in their requisition precedence, and upon his declining to do so he had been insulted by Councillor Taylor who had accused him of telling the other Councillors of their requisition being in and advising them to present a requisition of their own. He denied every word of the charge made by Councillor Taylor, and said he had no communication with any of the Councillors referred to by him until he saw them in the meeting.

The meeting adjourned sine die.

St. Joseph's Convent.

Yesterday evening at seven o'clock the chapel was filled with a dense congregation, assembled to assist at the services, which were to bring to a successful close the festival celebration of the Society's patron—St. Joseph. The Rev. Dr. McMillan, preached an edifying sermon on the Sicut, presenting him in character but glowing language to an attentive audience, and as the Protector of the Universal Church, and as the protector of each individual, as well in life as at death. Solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was then given by His Lordship the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. Fathers McGrath and Reid.

Revs D. J. G. Macdonald, Allan J. Macdonald, and P. J. Hogan occupied seats in the sanctuary. Amongst those present we noticed the Chief Justice and Mrs. and Miss Sullivan.

The music under the direction of Sister St. Joseph, was very select, and the pieces were all rendered in a truly devotional spirit. The sanctuary was brilliantly lighted, the altar of St. Joseph standing out prominently, bathed in a flood of light.

We are happy to see that the Society, which comprises fully 350 of the young ladies of the congregation, is in such a flourishing condition. Much of this is evidently due to the untiring energy of the good Sisters, who, by their May the good work continue to extend its usefulness, and may each returning feast serve to increase the fervor of its members.—Com.
