Bevan and 24 other Labor members of Parliament announced they will publish a new policy document as direct challenge to Prime Minister Attlee's administration.

Lt. - Gov. J. M. Uhrich Of Sask. Dies Suddenly

REGINA, June 15 (CP)—John M. Uhrich, a country doctor who became Saskatchewan's ninth lieutenant-governor, died suddenly today. He was stricken with a coronary thrombosis at his home at 3:30 A.M. and died in a Regina hospital at noon. He was 74.

French Election On Sunday

PARIS, June 15 (AP)—France attempts Sunday to elect an Assembly which can rule the country after two years of virtual deadlock among the parties forming the government. But indications are that the stalemate will continue — unless there should be a swing from the centre parties, which have ruled since 1946, to Gen. Charles de Gaulle.

Graduating Exercises At Notre Dame Academy

There was a very large attendance at the Commencement Exercises at Notre Dame Academy which were held last night with His Excellency Rev. James A. Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown, presiding. The address to the graduates was delivered by Rev. Dr. Patrick McMahon, who spoke of the custom of graduates of referring to the end of their academic career as a milestone. Dr. McMahon pointed out several connotations of the word and told the gathering that milestones encouraged the traveller as he neared his destination. He called them both resting places and sign posts and added that they would be meaningless unless the traveller knew where he was going.

Annual Meeting Of Bible Society

Dr. Lloyd W. Shaw, Charlottetown, was re-elected president of the P. E. I. Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society at its 112th annual meeting held yesterday afternoon in St. James Kirk Hall, Charlottetown. A representative gathering of the Auxiliary was in attendance and a great deal of important business was attended to relative to the Society and its work. The president, Dr. Shaw, presented a fine report, covering activities of the Society. The Auxiliary has just completed one of its most successful years. The treasurer, Mr. A. G. Putnam, presented the financial report, General Branch Contributions including Life Membership Certificates being \$6,070.77, which is an increase of \$108.38 over last year. Bequests yielded \$5,165.90 for the work of the Society, a magnificent increase over the \$1,282.00 of the year before. A grant of \$8,500.00 was made by the Auxiliary towards the world wide work of the British and Foreign Bible Society. Twenty-two new life membership certificates were issued during the year. The Bible House and Distribution Reports were presented by the Secretary, Mr. J. E. H. Worth. The Bible House has enjoyed an increasing patronage during the year, circulating quantities of Bibles, Hymnaries, etc. Sales were \$3,744.62. In connection with this work, Mrs. P. D. Williams was voted thanks for her interest in caring for the sales and secretary work for the Society.

TOKYO, June 16 (Saturday) (AP)—Allied armored fingers reached out Friday from the west and south toward Kumsong, Chinese Communist redoubt in Central Korea 29 miles north of parallel 38. Between the advancing United Nations forces, Red rear-guards fought bitterly for their only main escape road from the fallen "iron triangle."

Women Trapped On Upper Floors Of Old People's Home

MONTREAL, June 15 (CP)—At least 30 aged persons, all believed to be women, died today in a fire that swept the Ste. Cuneogonde Hospice. It was feared the death toll would mount when firemen worked deeper into the mass of debris. But that may take a day or more to complete. The Mother House of the Grey Nuns, who operate the Hospice for aged persons and children, reported tonight "about 40 persons are unaccounted for."

Canadians End Services In Korean Airlift

OTTAWA, June 15 (CP)—The 426 Thunderbird Squadron will return tomorrow to its home base at Dorval near Montreal "after 11 months on the Korean airlift," the R. C. A. F. announced tonight. The 12 aircraft and 400 men will start back tomorrow. They will stop over at Winnipeg, the first echelon reaching the Prairie city at about 2 p. m. CDT. An R. C. A. F. spokesman said the squadron—which has flown more than 2,900 combat trips and 1,000 tons of war equipment to Korea—is coming back to Dorval because the United States Air Force needs McChord Field near Tacoma, Wash., for other operations. Also there now were "less requirements" for the airlift.

Ask Extension Of Starch Program

A formal request for the extension of the starch program beyond the time agreed to by the Potato Marketing Board may be made to the Dominion Government by the P.E.I. and N.B. Potato Marketing Boards as a result of a joint meeting being held in Fredericton, Mr. E. D. Reid, Manager of the P.E.I. Marketing Board is taking part in the discussions.

Forecast Relaxation In Credit Controls On Cars

ST. ANDREWS, N.B., June 15 (CP)—Howard Moore, Toronto, managing director of the Federation of Automobile Dealers' Associations of Canada, said today that some relaxation in Federal credit restrictions on sales of new and used cars was possible in the near future. To obtain relief, however, figures would have to be presented to the Department of Finance giving proof of serious losses in car sales, he told the fifth annual joint convention of the Automobile Dealers' Associations of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. Mr. Moore said the Federation already had submitted figures showing a 28 per cent drop in sales during May. The Finance Department had requested further figures at the end of June. It was difficult to convince the Cabinet that an industry which enjoyed a 14 per cent increase in new car deliveries in the first five months of 1951 could "take a nose dive in the space of 30 days."

News In Brief

OTTAWA, June 15 (CP)—Railway proposals for higher freight rates and for action in connection with a move for a new system of setting rates were taken under advisement today by the Board of Transport Commissioners. TORONTO, June 15 (CP)—Two Toronto butchers were charged today with selling horsemeat as beef contrary to the Foods and Drugs Act. Police said the men, Percy Boyd and R. F. Newton, sold "horsemeat beef" containing horsemeat and beef that was adulterated. VANCOUVER, July 15 (CP)—Trade unionists here plan to start a "no beef buying" strike Monday. But the workers will not join the Congress of Canadian Women who plan to picket butcher stores and meat markets to protest high prices. LONDON, June 15 (Reuters)—Retail price-fixing by British manufacturers will be forbidden, Sir Hartley Shawcross announced amid cheers today.

No Sign Chinese Ready For Terms

OTTAWA, June 15 (CP)—External Affairs Minister Pearson returned to Ottawa from Washington today with a buoyant report on the military situation in Korea but unable to report any sign that the Chinese are ready to talk peace. It is understood that his report to cabinet colleagues is to the effect that militarily the Korean picture is good but that politically there is no sign that hostilities are near an end. Mr. Pearson told the Commons in a foreign policy debate today that he discussed the Far Eastern situation as well as other matters in a meeting with State Secretary Dean Acheson.

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United Church Sessions Continue At Sackville

SACKVILLE, N. S., June 15 (CP)—More than one hundred changes of pastorate and new ministers placed were contained in the final draft of the report of the settlement committee at today's session of the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada. The conference protested to the Minister of Trade and Commerce and Minister of Defence Production for the use of essential building materials for the construction of or extensions to breweries, distilleries and other establishments in connection with the manufacture, storage and sale of liquors. The conference also urged the Government of the three Maritime Provinces to assume responsibility for rent control within their respective areas. SACKVILLE, June 15 — P.E.
