Obituary.

We regret to hear of the death of La-
crosse, Wisconsin, on Saturday morning,
20th December, of Alex. F. Kennedy brother
of James W. Kennedy, Postmaster at
Southport, Lot 48. According to the ex-
pressed wish of the deceased, his brother
has gone on to bring the body home for
interment. Mr. Kennedy left the Island
when quite young, going to Boston, where
he carried on business for some time. He
then went to Lacrosse, where he carried on
the bookbinding and stationery business
successfully. The burial will take place at
the Cemetery, Cross Roads, Lot 48, of
which due notice will be given.

Peacefully passed away, on the 3rd Decem-
ber, an old and respected resident of Caven-
dish, John McKenzie, Esq., in his 76th year
of his age. He was for many years an elder
in the Presbyterian Church at that place,
where he always took an active part in all
the affairs of the Church. He was a man of
few words, but by his uprightness of char-
acter and his love of what was right, he leaves
behind him an example worthy of imi-
tation by those who are left behind to take
his place. He leaves a wife, three sons and
