WEST PRINCE CONVENTION.

Hackett the Choice—Ex-Governor Howlan's Letter.

The convention at O'Leary last Wednesday, at which Edward Hackett, Esq., was unanimously chosen as the Liberal-Conservative standard-bearer for West Prince, is described as the largest and most enthusiastic Conservative convention ever held west. There were ninety-two delegates from the different parishes, besides a large number of electors generally, the hall in which the meeting was held being well filled.

Mr. Hackett's nomination was received with great enthusiasm. Mr. Hackett, in the course of a speech acknowledging the honor done him, took up the public questions of the day, which he discussed in a vigorous manner. He scored the government severely for the manner in which they had increased customs taxation, annual expenditure and the prices of many of the necessities of life. He contrasted the Conservative policy of developing the country and its industries with the Laurier government's long record of broken promises.

Speeches appropriate to the occasion were made by Mr. Jos. F. Arsenault, M. L. A., Mr. J. E. Birch, M. L. A., Dr. Murphy, Geo. R. Montgomery and others.

A letter was read from Hon. G. W. Howlan, who expressed his regret that his health did not permit him to be present and hoped that they would all rally to the support of Mr. Hackett, whose nomination he anticipated.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the delegates of the Liberal-Conservative Association of West Prince, in convention assembled at O'Leary, this 22nd day of August, 1900, acknowledge with great pleasure the letter from Hon. G. W. Howlan, evidencing, as it does, his deep interest in the political affairs of this riding, with which he was for many years so closely identified. At the same time they sincerely regret to learn of his impaired health, but trust that the near future will see him restored to complete physical vigor, and that he will thus be enabled to take an active part in the coming campaign, in which the triumphant return of Mr. Hackett is looked for.

The convention then adjourned.
