Mr. Bell noted that Kings County was getting lopsided with appointments namely: highway general, welfare, labor, health and education. He said he understood there was a member of two from Kings who were seeking cabinet appointments. "I believe you realize Kings County has only 17,000 population — the size of Charlottetown and Royalty," he said.

"The Bill of Rights to Agriculture" was the term applied by Mr. Bell to the Federal Government's farm stabilization bill. He said it was one of the most important things that has ever happened to agriculture and "long last the farmers of Prince Edward Island could look for an equitable return from their products."

He noted that a Liberal candidate who he referred to as a dealer, was attacking the bill strongly in his election campaign. Mr. Bell termed this attack "sheer bluff in an effort to scare the farmers of the province."

EXPLAINS BILL

The candidate, he said, was stating that under support prices butter would go down to 47 cents a pound. Mr. Bell then read the contents of the act, noting that a minimum floor price of 80 per cent of the past 10-year average would be set on specifically named products and other products could be brought in at the recommendation of the stabilization board.

Mr. Bell said he was very glad to see that farm prices this year were up considerably over last year."

LIKES CONCRETE ROADS

Agreement with the mover of the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne was expressed by Mr. Bell who felt that more concrete roads should be built each year in the province. He said the extension of the TCH in the province had speeded up transportation which perhaps could account for the changes in railway service.

Mr. Bell felt that although a lot of money was being spent on the tourist industry it was well worth while. He pointed out however that roads leading to the National Park should be given more care. He told of an instance last summer where the bridge at Rusticoville and at Wheatley River were both torn up at the same time, thus making it impossible to use the Rustico road to the Park.

He said the Mayfield road was used and tourists had to travel over a dusty rough road during the months of July and August. He felt it was a grave error to have bridges torn up during

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amended four times before it was finally passed. Many of the Conservative back benches, he said "raised Cain."

ROAD BUILDING OFFER

The Premier revealed to the House a letter which he had received from Hon. Mr. Hamilton, Minister of Lands and Northern Affairs.

The letter showed that the Government was willing to grant 7 1/2 million dollars to any province on a fifty-fifty basis over a five year period, for the purpose of building a road of pioneer standards to any area of potential development. "I was cautioned in the letter not to reveal its contents but a few nights ago I read where the Minister of Justice and the Minister of Northern Affairs both spoke of this grant in Western Canada."

"That's the kind of thing we are being offered by the Diefenbaker Government," said Mr. Matheson. "They are making 7 1/2 million dollars available to any province and we cannot use one cent of it."

"Can we use it to build the Mayfield Road that the Leader of the Opposition was talking about this afternoon? I think not," said the Premier.

NEW LEADERSHIP

Mr. Matheson noted that the attendance on the part of the Opposition was better than last year. "I believe there was only one of his party present when the leader spoke. Maybe the man behind the rail is using the whip to good advantage."

"If he had made the effort to see that the House Leader had gotten his just reward, perhaps he himself might now be inside."
