

**Local and Other Items.**

THE discovery of a strange rocking stone is reported from Masham, Ont.

THE Charlottetown Engine Co. meet for drill this evening at the usual hour—7.30.

THE Brig "Zinga" Captain Sam. McLean, consigned to owners, Messrs. Peake Bros. & Co. in ballast, reported at Customs, to-day.

CATTLE EXPORT.—On Saturday last Capt. John Elworth, of Southport, shipped forty head of cattle to St. John's, Newfoundland.

THE Queen has signified her royal pleasure that the Canadian Academy of Arts shall be called the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts.

A THUNDER STORM of unusual violence passed over this Province on Sunday morning. The rain was very heavy, the lightning vivid and thunder terrific. We have not yet heard of any damage being done by it.

Richard Hall, the well known cattle sales man, of Liverpool, arrived in Toronto Friday evening. It is the intention of the Butcher's and Cattle Dealers Association to tender him a banquet at the Rossin House during his stay.

PROVINCIAL RIFLE SHOOTING.—In the consolation match finished to-day, Sergeant W. Conley, of No. 1 Batt., Charlottetown Artillery, carried off first prize, and the second prize was won by Gunner McKinnon, of Georgetown Battery of Garrison Artillery.

POLICE PENALTIES.—Thomas McCloskey is in custody on charge of stealing a bottle of alcohol from Mr. Gabriel McDonald. Patrick McCourt was arrested by the police for destroying ornaments in the garden of Mrs. Ralph B. Peake. He is now awaiting trial.

AN Ottawa despatch, says:—The lumber trade between Montreal and South America is again very active. A large number of ships left yesterday, and the Hochelaga wharves are crowded with others taking in their cargoes. One firm is shipping 15,000,000 feet to South America.

It is said that Mr. Thomas Nelson, is to have supreme business management of the Toronto Globe, and as regards politics, the Globe "will be, in future, free from the very appearance of mere party complication and will take a more judicial and independent course than it has hitherto got credit for." So says the Toronto correspondent of the London Advertiser.

ACADEMY OF MUSIC.—This place of amusement opens positively Friday evening next, with "All that Glitters" and "White vs. Brown." The plans are open now for both Friday and Saturday evenings, and seats may be secured for each or both nights. The building is rapidly assuming new features, and workmen will be employed day and night to enable it to be opened on the date advertised.

BUSINESS IN P. E. I.—A gentleman from Prince Edward Island brings a full confirmation of reports received at different times that the present is proving one of the most prosperous summers the Island has ever seen. There seems to be a little financial stringency. The Local Government of the day, by a rigid practice of economy, has doubtless done much to restore confidence.—Moncton Times.

THE RAILWAY MISSION.—The Toronto Mail's cablegram from London, 19th inst., says:—The arrangements with the syndicate for the construction of the Canada Pacific Railway out of the lands of the North West are progressing very satisfactorily. It is almost unnecessary to say that the settlement of the details is a task involving considerable labor, but the British capitalists and the Ministers are working together most harmoniously and the final and complete arrangements will probably be made within a few days.

A NEW PREPARATION.—Mr. Griffin, the fish merchant, recently imported from the States, a new description of salt, known as a chemical salt, costing \$1 per pound in New York. A pound of this salt is sufficient to preserve 15 salmon for transportation abroad. A salmon was caught in our waters on Monday and after being dipped in a pickle made of this salt, it was despatched to St. Louis for a Fourth of July dinner. It was served up eight days after being caught, and was found in excellent condition, tasting as fresh as it would have been the day it was caught, a peculiarity of the salt being that it leaves no salt flavor in the food which it is used to cure. No ice or snow was needed in packing the fish. A salt of this description would seem to be invaluable for all kinds of fish.—St. John Sun.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

**EUROPEAN.**

LONDON, Aug. 19.

The "Times" ridicules as paltry the theatrical exploits of the Fenians in Ireland, but regards the anti rent agitation as serious, and says it should meet with patient and determined statesmanship.

In the House of Lords, Lord Oranmore called attention to the dangers to the peace of Ireland from the agitations of the land league and the Fenians, whose organs in America are largely circulated in Ireland. Earl Spencer said the Irish land agitation is most pernicious and exceedingly dangerous to peace. It is not intended to imitate the late Government's abortive persecutions, however. The condition of several parts of Ireland is very grave, and deserves the most serious attention, but no special legislation is intended.

T. P. O'Connor, Home Ruler, Galway, will move on Monday that it is no longer just or expedient that all measures for the improvement of the condition of the people of England, Ireland and Scotland, should be at the mercy of a body of legislators, hereditary and irresponsible.

LONDON, Aug. 20.

J. Pierpont Edwards has been appointed Consul at New York.

ROME, Aug. 20.

In the Consistory to-day, the Pope pronounced his allocution. After enumerating the grievances of the Church in Belgium, his holiness declared he was quite prepared to suffer personal insult on behalf of the Holy See, but would never allow the apostolic dignity of the Papacy to be insulted, even though its defence might cost him his life. He said that the injuries to the church were not limited to Belgium, and on a future occasion he would refer to some other circumstances which were a source of sorrow and anguish to the Church.

LONDON, Aug. 20.

Adelaide Neilson was buried at Brompton cemetery to-day. The funeral was largely attended.

**UNITED STATES.**

CINCINNATI, Aug. 20.

A wealthy farmer of New Philadelphia, O., died yesterday from the effects of a severe bite on his hand, inflicted by his insane son.

CORPUS CHRISTI, TEX., Aug. 20.

Brownsville, Texas, near the mouth of the Rio Grande, was nearly destroyed by a fearful storm which prevailed along the Texas coast on the 12th and 13th inst. Many lives were lost. The telegraph lines were torn down and therefore no communication can be had with the stricken city.

NENAH, WIS., Aug. 20.

Albert Haxley, farmer, aged 78 years, was shot this morning by his son-in-law, North S. Emmons, who lives with him. Emmons then shot himself, both dying within an hour.

One of the old English Roman Catholic nobles, Lord Clifford, is dead. Under every persecution the Cliffords adhered to the ancient faith, and many of them embraced the priesthood or became members of a religious order of the Roman Catholic Church. They mostly resided abroad. It is pleasantly told of this Lord's father, the seventh Lord Clifford, that he was so ignorant of English pastimes that he proposed to bring on a motion for the payment of Catholic chaplains in the army on Wednesday, "the Derby Day," when he was met, to his astonishment, by cries of "Derby! Derby!" After the explanation of this, to him, strange interruption was made by a Lord near him, he at once apologized, saying: "So, if you will allow me, my lords, I will name Friday, 'the Oaks day,' when finding cries again of 'Oaks! Oaks!' he sat down, saying: 'I give you up.' The family estates are small, but the residence, Ugbrooke Park, is prettily placed in Devonshire.

The Chillians appear more determined than ever to capture Lima, and have gathered 30,000 men about the city which they propose to increase to 45,000. The garrison consists of 10,000 effective men. It is stated that the Chillians have 6,000 men in the northern department of Peru, destroying plantations and sacking defenceless towns.
