THE death of Richard Murray, of Clifton, on April 18th, of this year removed from the community one of its oldest and most esteemed members. He was born in Lot 48, and at the time of his death was 80 years old. His father was John Murray, a man who in his time was deservedly respected for his Christian ability, and possessed of good ability as a speaker. He moved to Pleasant Valley, and being a carpenter by trade he built most of the churches and schoolhouses for miles around and at the same time preached the Gospel as a local Methodist preacher. Richard Murray moved to Clifton in 1870

A few years later at special meetings held in the old Presbyterian Church, he was converted and from that time was earnest in the service of Christ. A year later he was elected to the eldership. Some may speak lightly of special services, and no doubt with some reason, but it is because they see the chaff and there is chaff rather than the wheat; they have an eye for life's failures rather than for life's triumphs. It can be said that the large number of ministers and elders date their conversion to similar evangelistic services. Faithful in his duties to the church, gentle and loving in the home; most patient in suffering, thinking ever of the comfort and care of others; Mr. Murray's life bore a true testimony to the power of the Gospel, and was a triumph of Christian grace. During his last illness often he spoke of his own unworthiness and emphasized the infinite merits of Christ on which he rested with simple and entire confidence. He had the joy of seeing his four children that survive him become useful members of the Church of Christ. His wife passed away five months before him, aged 75 years. They trod the path of life together and in death, where not long separated, theirs was a happy home, where all received a welcome.—Com.
