## Professor MacGuigan Addresses Atlantic Group

FREDERICTON (CP) — Dr. Mark MacGuigan, professor of Law at the University of Toronto, says contemporary Protestant theology is struggling "just as manfully" with the problem of articulating a relevant theology of this world as in the present Roman Catholic theology.

Addressing an Atlantic regional social life conference here during the weekend, Dr. MacGuigan said the tradition of "otherworldliness" is not exclusively a problem for Roman Catholics.

He quoted a part of the Roman Catholic Church's decree on the apostolate of the laity and said there is no doubt "this new theology tremendously extends the range of the Christian's freedom. He is now free to make choices in the whole secular area... without any direction from the institutional church except at the level of principle. Within the confines of Christian principles, he is free to do as he likes."

Dr. MacGuigan said the work of spelling out the implications of this doctrine will provide a source of speculation for centuries. "It will radically alter the traditional modes of Catholic education in which the aim was to make the student a dependent, not an independent, thinker."

## Legion President Calls For Support

Bishop Hayes said the world has practically appealed to the church for guidance and appears disposed to accept it. The reception given to the person and message of Pope Paul when he visited the United Nations General Assembly last fall were proof in point of this.

"It was as though the leaders of the international community almost at the point of desperation turned to the Pope as a religious leader, man of God, for guidance."

Most Rev. Alfred B. Leverman, bishop of Saint John, also addressed the two-day conference which ended Sunday. About 240 persons attended.

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## Marriage Increase Reported

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports that a 36.2 per cent increase in marriages and a 16.5 decrease in births has been recorded in Prince Edward Island for the first four months of this year compared to 1965.

The P.E.I. figures follow the pattern that has been apparent across Canada for the past two years where marriages have been on the rise but the number of births has declined steadily. To the end of April this year there were 696 births registered on the Island compared to 834 for the same period a year ago. Marriages rose from 95 last year to 128 for the first four months of this year.

The Island's natural population increase to the end of April was 329 as deaths numbered 367 compared to the 696 births. The number of deaths was up from 337 to the end of April last year. Across Canada as a whole, births dropped 7.4 per cent from

last year while marriages were up 3.9 per cent and deaths were down 3.1 per cent. Figures for April alone show 160 births, 13 marriages and 92 deaths in Prince Edward Island. These figures compare with 261 births, 21 marriages and 98 deaths in April 1965.

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## Car Spare Tire Breaks Window

A large window on the Queen Street corner of the Toronto-Dominion Bank was broken Saturday night by a spare tire which was propelled from an automobile involved in a two-car collision that caused extensive damage to the cars involved.

The accident, city police reported, occurred at the intersection of Kent and Queen streets shortly before midnight.

The spare tire from a 1959 Vauxhall operated by Jean C. Court, Elm Ave., gained momentum after her automobile was involved in a crash with a 1958 Meteor operated by Merrill L. MacInnis, Vernon Bridge. The Vauxhall was proceeding south on Queen while the other car was travelling east on Kent Street at the time of collision.

The woman received neck injuries and a passenger, Helen McKerny, was cut on the ankle. Mr. MacInnis was reported uninjured.

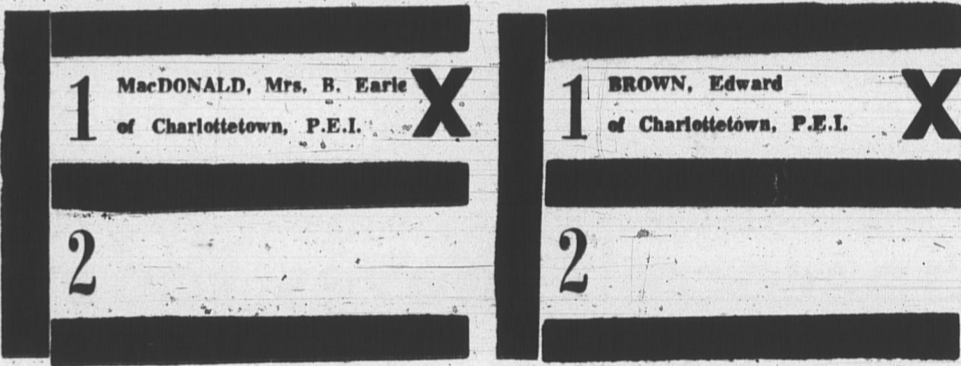

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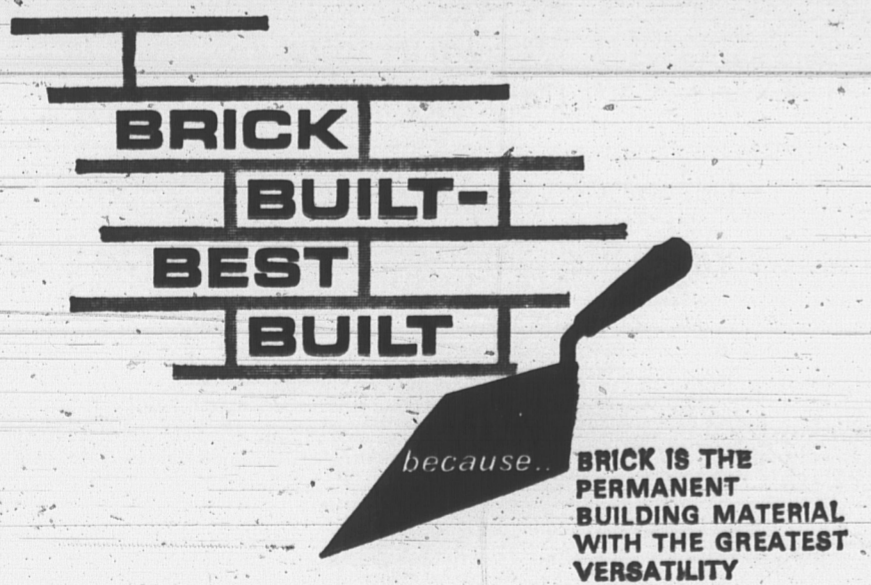
