

Magistrate Warns Accused Following Assault Trial

Convicted on a charge of common assault, William Connolly McGrath, Morell, was fined \$50 and costs or 30 days in jail by Magistrate A.J. Haslam in a city police court yesterday.

McGrath, counselled by Lester O'Donnell, was charged with assaulting Donald Lee, Charlottetown, who testified that the accused had struck him on the ribs following an argument in Mr. Lee's restaurant Sunday morning. Also testifying for the prosecution was Cst. Sterling Williams of the city police force.

In passing sentence the magistrate said that assaulting the proprietor in a restaurant was "indecent too far" and harmful for business. The accused was also ordered to stay away from the restaurant for one year.

A fine of \$125 and costs or 90 days was imposed on George J. Claude MacKinnon of Malpeque Road. Charged with driving intoxicated, MacKinnon pleaded guilty to the lesser charge of driving while impaired. Counsel for the accused was Lester O'Donnell.
