Red Campaign Against Orphanage Began With Mildness

WINNIPEG, (CP)—The campaign which saw their Manchurian orphanage turned into a Communist hell began with deceptive mildness, say four sisters of the Immaculate Conception Order who passed through here Wednesday night on their way to Montreal.

From the first their travel was restricted, as it had been during the years of the Japanese occupation. But there was little actual interference. Then as the weeks passed aid from Canada was cut off and in June, 1947, the Reds struck with a heavy fist. They seized the orphanage and confined the sisters to one room, their charges to another. Red soldiers moved in downstairs. Two months later two priests attached to the mission were jailed on charges they were aiding the nationalists.

The story was told by sisters Marie-Josephine, Marie-Medatrice, Marie-de-La Charite and Ste. Emmentienne. Sister Charite said life in one room was "dreadful". Communist officials seemed to be constantly finding ways to enter and search it, depriving the sisters of the little privacy remaining.

The sisters took to spinning cotton to earn money for food, yet they continued to care for the orphans. Sister Marie-Josephine said the people of the region refused to make the accusations against the nuns. The Communists sought incriminations of mistreatment, of incompetent medical care and of spying.

In August, 1948, the two priests were released and the pressure on the mission eased. In 1950 the Reds began forming a Chinese church. Finally charges were brought against the superior and the other sisters decided to leave the country with her. Twenty-nine Chinese nuns remained behind. Sister
