A LITTLE BATTLE NEARER SANTIAGO.

Americans Victorious.

SPANIARDS HAD ADVANTAGE
IN NUMBERS AND POSITION.

Americans are now at the Threshold
of Santiago.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

GUANTANAMO BAY, June 25.—Yesterday (Friday) about a thousand American troops attacked two thousand Spanish soldiers in a thicket five miles from Santiago. The Americans beat the enemy back into the city. Twelve Americans were killed and at least fifty Americans were wounded, including six officers. Several of the wounded will die.

Twelve dead Spaniards were found in the bush after the fight; but the Spanish loss was doubtless far in excess of that.

General Young, commanded the expedition and was with the regulars, while Colonel Wood directed the operations of the rough riders several miles west. Both parties struck the Spaniards at the same time and the fight lasted an hour.

The Spaniards opened fire from a thicket and brush and had every advantage of numbers and position. But the American troops drove them back from the start, storming the blockhouse around which they made a final stand, and sent them scattering over the mountain.

The Americans now hold a position at the threshold of Santiago de Cuba with more troops going forward constantly and they are preparing for a final assault upon that city.

THREATENING A DESCENT ON SPAIN

Fleet to be Despatched

SPANIARDS TO BE BROUGHT TO
THEIR SENSES

By Having the Coast of Spain
Ravaged.

WASHINGTON, June 25.—The war is to be carried into Africa if Spain is foolhardy enough to send the Cadiz fleet through the Suez canal to attack Dewey in the Philippines.

It is announced on good authority that before the last Spanish vessel has passed through the canal an American squadron will be steaming across the Atlantic straight for the coast of Spain to bring the Spanish people to a realizing sense of the hopelessness of the continuance of the present war.

After the fall of Santiago and the capture or destruction of Cervera's squadron, Admiral Sampson will have an abundance of vessels to spare for the task set forth.

MARTIAL LAW IN SPAIN.

Sagasta's Government
Will Resign.

NEW GOVERNMENT WILL BE
FOR PEACE.

Negotiations to That End Will at
Once be Opened.

LONDON, June 25.—The Madrid correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says: "When the cortes closed yesterday, martial law was proclaimed."

The Sagasta Cabinet will resign and make way for a new government which will open negotiations for peace.

Bombardment of Casilda.

MADRID, June 22.—An official despatch from Havana says: "An American vessel bombarded the town of Casilda, province of Santa Clara, about five miles south of Trinidad, with which it is connected by rail, for three hours. She fired 150 big shells. The troops and the gunboat Dependiente co-operated in a brilliant defence, and the American vessel was obliged to retire after damaging some houses and shops."

FAST DRIVING—THE ROADWAY

SIR.—Notwithstanding the fact that a case for damages is hanging over the heads of some of those who use the Park Roadway for training purposes, this dangerous practice is greatly on the increase. With one of the best half-mile tracks in the Dominion within reach of all citizens whose horses are worth developing for speed, it is cause for astonishment that the owners and drivers of such horses should persist in utilizing the beautiful driveway in front of Government House for this purpose, to the imminent danger of well-behaved citizens who resort thither for legitimate pleasure. It is not enough that the lives of two unoffending young ladies should have been jeopardized by reckless driving, but it would seem as if human life must be really sacrificed before a halt is called.

Was it for the purpose, of providing a boulevard for speeding fast trotting horses that the large expenditure necessary for the construction of this roadway was taken from the pockets of our citizens? Is there no means by which this dangerous pastime can be effectually stopped? Have the city authorities no jurisdiction in the premises? Or if they have, are they so invulnerable to the dangers to which peaceable citizens are daily subjected at the hands of a band of horsemen as to take no steps whatever to enforce law and order on the most beautiful thoroughfare in the city? Surely it will not require the rude awakening of a Coroner's inquest over the mangled remains of some horse-trodden victim to open the eyes of the authorities to a realization of the duties and responsibilities devolving upon them.
