P. E. ISLAND HOSPITAL.—The annual collection for the P. E. Island Hospital will be taken up in the Methodist Brick Church on Easter Sunday at both morning and evening services.
THE BEST YET.—John Mills, of this city, died at Charlottetown on Mount Stewart on Thursday in the remarkably fast time of fifty minutes. He was started from the ferry wharf here at 10.10, and reached Mount Stewart at 11 o'clock.
Y. M. C. A.—The free night in the Y. M. C. A. rooms last night, brought out a large number of young men. Prof. Harcourt's talk on Chemistry was very practical and much appreciated.

Some novel features were given in the gymnastics, causing much merriment to the spectators.
CORRECTION.—In the report of Mr. Bailey's speech in reply to Mr. Peters, published in Thursday's issue, the amount expended on the Stock Farm buildings was printed \$96,425 instead of \$964,25; and the amount of expenditure on bridges charged to capital account was inadvertently given as \$24,247 instead of \$15,211.20.

POLICE PENCILINGS.—One drunk was fined \$2 or 8 days this forenoon.
The record of cases disposed of at the police court during the month of March is the smallest for years past. There were two convictions for nuisance, two for violation of the Liquor Regulation Act, one for assault, and three for drunkenness. One person charged with perjury was sent up for trial in the Supreme Court, and one assault case was dismissed.

THE EASTER MARKET.
NOTWITHSTANDING the bad condition of the roads, there was a good attendance at the market today. Beef sold at from 12 to 16 cents per lb., and eggs brought from 11 to 12 cents per dozen. There was no material change in the price of other articles. The display of beef was excellent—the quality being fully equal, if not superior, to that of last year. Messrs. Blake Bros. (notwithstanding the fact that they sent their fattest cattle to Halifax) made an uncommonly good showing. Their display included three steers, the aggregate weight of which was 2,750 lbs., and one cow which weighed 750 lbs. Messrs. Saunders & Campbell showed four choice carcasses of beef, weighing in the aggregate 3,039 lbs., as well as a quantity of smoked hams, bacon, etc. George Thorne had on sale three carcasses of beef, the aggregate weight of which was 1,792 lbs. John Drake slaughtered five cattle, the aggregate weight of which was 3,465 lbs. Henry McGregor had one carcass of beef which weighed 800 lbs., and one carcass of spring lamb; Jenkins Bros., 2 carcasses, 1476 lbs; S. Gray, 1 carcass, 830 lbs; Curley Wood, 2 carcasses weighing 1492 lbs; S. Brown, 1 cow, 850 lbs, and 1 lamb, 16 lbs; E. Brown, 1 cow, 842 lbs; John McNeill, 3 carcasses beef aggregating 2,140 lbs., and 4 lambs; H. Bell, 2 carcasses beef, 1274 lbs; Wm. Seller, 4 carcasses aggregating 1874; P. Corish, 1 carcass beef weighing 750 lbs and 1 lamb; B. Henderson, 2 carcasses aggregating 1370 lbs; P. Trainor, 1 carcass, 610 lbs.

Ottawa, April 1.

Deep regret is felt here over the death of Mrs. McKenzie, widow of the ex-Premier McKenzie, which occurred in Toronto on Thursday night.
In the House of Commons on Thursday night, a bill respecting coal oil was passed without amendment.
