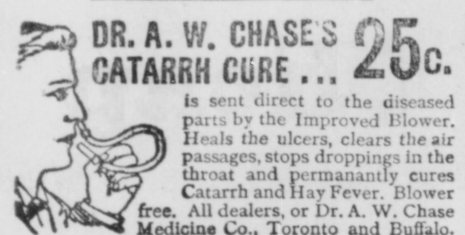

### "B.P." AND PLUMER.

The whole of the Marico and Rustenburg district is pacified. Already over 3,000 rifles have been given in to General Baden-Powell's forces, which have patrolled the whole of the country between Rustenburg and Mafeking.

Snyman's army fled in complete rout, followed along the Zeerust road by Plumer's small column, while General Baden-Powell, with the Protectorate Regiment too the lower road by the lead mine. The Boers, in full flight, passed impregnable positions in the Tegallis berg without attempting to hold the neck where 50 men could keep an army at bay. At every mile some of the burghers dropped out, and now nearly all are back on their farms except the ring-leaders.

The Marico and Rustenburg district is thoroughly patrolled by the small force at General Baden-Powell's command with the result that there is not the slightest danger of any rising against these.

Further south it is reported that several Boers are getting away to join De Wet. The issue now depends upon the Free State campaign. When De Wet is finally crushed Botha will probably give in, and the last of the Boers' resistance will collapse.

Rustenburg is a hotbed of Krugerdom. Three sons of the President and one brother surrendered there to Colonel Plumer, Casper Kruger, the eldest son, is chiefly anxious to sell forage to the British. Commandant Duplessis, with 70 men, who held out in the hills for some time, has now escaped to the east to join Botha.

A telegram was found on Duplessis' farm from President Kruger, dated Machadodorp, on the Delagoa railway, telling the burghers not to be deceived by Lord Roberts' proclamation, which was merely a bait to catch them and imprison them for high treason.

### LI HUNG CHANG HELD IN CONTEMPT.

"Li Hung Chang is discussed only with expressions of contempt by all classes in China. The old Chinaman is selfish, unscrupulous demagogue, ready, to ally himself with the emperors, the Boxers or the foreigners, whichever promise best to serve him.

"There is not the remotest foundation for the charge that tactlessness of missionaries is responsible for the present crisis. It is simply the culmination of foreign hatred of long growth.

Germany's occupation of Kiaochow is one of the most recent aggravations of the anti-foreign frenzy, while the building of the railway from Tien Tsin to Peking is another provocation. The ignorant natives have been led to believe that a Chinese child lies buried under every tie of the road and that the wells along the route have been poisoned by the foreigners.

'Vanity Fair,' London, announces that Lord Methuen is coming home from South Africa at once, the principal reason being that he is at longheads with several of his officers.
