JUDGE HENSLEY has decided that the Scot Act is legally in operation in this city. Those who have broken the law, and have or will be fined, must now pay up. After the scene which he witnessed last evening, the Stipendiary Magistrate is not likely to deal easily with law-breakers.

PROF. ROSEDALE who it will be remembered accompanied the troupe of Native Palestine Arabs to this city last July, intends giving an entertainment relating to the manners and customs of the Orientals, to our citizens at an early day. We bespeak for the Professor a bumper house, such as an entertainment of that kind merits.

WE are requested by Mr. J. J. Chappell to state that the letter dated Sept. 5, bearing his name as Secretary of the "Scott Act Committee," and received by a number of persons lately engaged in the liquor business in this city, are base forgeries. From information just received, the unprincipled fellow has been found out and, we trust, will be punished as he so richly deserves.

THE *Telegraph*, as a corroboration of journalism, is worth studying. It denies that Mr. Blake favors the taxing of tea and coffee, then admits that he opposes removing the duties from them instead of lowering the duty on manufacture. That is to say, Mr. Blake does not want tea and coffee taxed, but if you must tax something, pile it upon tea and coffee in preference to anything else! And this is the *Telegraph's* defence of Mr. Blake on this question.—*Moncton Times*.

A SECOND Sugar Refinery in operation in Halifax—And the Halifax Refinery sending sugar to the Upper Provinces at the rate of six hundred barrels per week.—The directors of the Halifax Cotton Factory Co. propose to "locate the factory somewhere on the high ground in the northwestern portion of the peninsula," says the *Chronicle*. Which will go to show how Halifax is being ruined by the National Policy.—*St. John Sun*.

A MOVING CLOUD OF ANTS.—The people of Emerson, Manitoba, were recently startled by an unusual phenomenon in the shape of clouds of ants flying in the air from west to east, and extending for miles around. They were apparently ordinary black ants provided with wings. During the night myriads of these insects came to the earth, and the streets and sidewalks were literally black with them. The Red River was also covered with a coating of the ants an inch thick. The atmosphere was exceedingly sultry and the light was considerably impaired, so heavy were the clouds during the time at which the ants were passing over the town.

NEW BRUNSWICK'S latest importation of pure bred stock consists of four Short Horn bulls and eight cows and heifers; two Hereford bulls and one heifer; four Red Polled Norfolk bulls and four cows and heifers; three Black Polled Angus bull and three heifers; three Ayrshire bulls and five heifers; nineteen Border Leicester rams and five ewes; sixteen English Leicester rams and ten ewes; nine Shropshire rams and fourteen ewes; twelve Cotswold rams and five ewes; thirteen Berkshire boars and six sows; 4 Yorkshire boars and two sows. The cattle are all in splendid order. Some of the Short Horns are very nice in particular a bull from the Queen's Windsor farm; and a four-year old cow with calf alongside showing a good deal of Duchess—in fact, an animal of very superior quality, very few equal to her having been brought across the Atlantic. The Herefords are good, the heifer particularly so. The Red Polled Norfolk are a new breed for this country.

ATTENTION GIRLS.—The *Gateway Express*, published at Emerson, Manitoba, says: It is an undeniable fact that in Manitoba the right kind of girls are scarce, and consequently the men are bachelors by a large majority. There are hundreds and hundreds of cases of single young men engaged in farming and making a comfortable living in this country, who are desirous of becoming united with a partner of the gentler sex, but on account of the extreme scarcity are obliged to live in a state of "single blessedness." A few years ago it was a rare thing to meet a single woman in this country, except it was a half breed or a squaw, but latterly their numbers in the more populous parts of the Province of Manitoba are increasing, and now we can boast of as fine looking girls in Emerson and Winnipeg as can be found in any of the cities and towns of eastern Canada. But there is not enough of them. The thousands of young men who are settling in this country every year will naturally, in a short time, want wives, and if the surplus girls of the older towns of Canada do not take the advice of the *Toronto World*, many of the young men will live and die old bachelors.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

HALIFAX, Sept. 5.

Dr. Cogswell brought from Chezzetcook, on Saturday, some fine specimens of quartz from leads recently discovered there. One of the leads discovered is six feet wide, the others two inches and upwards. There is great excitement at Chezzetcook and a small army of prospectors are there.

UNITED STATES.

TUCSON, Sept. 5.

Major McClelland with sixty men of the Sixth Cavalry, left Lowell for Thom and goes to observe the movements of the Indians on the lower San Pedro.

Up to 8 p. m. nothing further has been learned in confirmation or otherwise from the scenes of the massacre. All women and children are being moved from Thomas to Fort Grant. Fifty cavalry have been ordered from the Dept. of Platte. This is the old fighting regiment of Arizona. Indians with Government carbines, the same as used by scouts, were seen near Fort Bowie yesterday. They had time to reach that point since the massacre.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 5.

Major Wilcox, of the 8th Infantry, leaves here to-morrow morning with two hundred men, on a special train for Arizona as fast as possible. These troops are veteran Indian fighters. The First Cavalry is much scattered on the coast, but has been ordered to Arizona, and will be sent south as soon as possible. The Fourth Artillery is ready for marching, but will not be sent until positively needed. Army officers here, familiar with the southern Arizona Indians, agree that a general rising of the Arizona and New Mexico tribes is imminent.

GLOUCESTER, Sept. 5.

Schr. Henry Wilson, which arrived this morning from the Grand Banks, reports two of her crew missing—George Nelson and John Graves—who left the vessel August 23rd to reset their trawls, and were unable to get back on account of thick fog. There is no hope that they have been picked up. They were natives of Chester, N. S., but followed fishing from here for several years.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5.

Official Bulletin—8:50 a. m.—The President was somewhat restless during the early part of the night, but slept well after midnight. He has taken by the mouth and retained nutrient prescribed. This morning his pulse is less frequent than yesterday. His temperature is a degree above normal. Pulse, 102; temperature, 99.5; respiration, 10.

EUROPEAN.

ROME, Sept. 5.

Lieut. Bove, arctic explorer, has started for Buenos Ayres, on an expedition to South Patagonia.

CHEERLESS, Sept. 5.

Gambetta, speaking at a banquet last night, said he did not think it would be well to re-open the question of electoral reform immediately on the meeting of the new Chamber of Deputies, that it should not be abandoned but only postponed, a fresh appeal to the country being inadvisable.

DUBLIN, Sept. 5.

Reports of the projected exhibition of Irish manufacture is generally supported, all classes subscribing therefor—the Marquis of Waterford giving £100. The excellent weather during the past week leads to the expectation that the harvest will be good.

LONDON, Sept. 5.

The "News" says Sir George Elliot's statement during his canvass in North Durham that he desired to see the "suspects" released probably secured for him some Irish votes. The eminent physician and medical writer, Archibald Billing, is dead, aged 90.

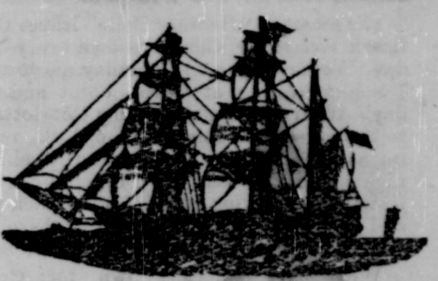
