AFRAID OF PUBLICITY.

It is truly remarked by the St. John Sun that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues are pursuing a mistaken policy in refusing a full investigation in the case of definite charges made by the opposition. If no wrong has been committed the result of a fair investigation would vindicate the accused and confound the accusers. One can imagine, says the Sun, the scornful eloquence of Sir Wilfrid, the scathing sarcasm of Sir Richard, and the bellowing thunder of Sir Louis and Hon. Mr. Paterson if it were a Tory Government that tried to head off an enquiry into the conduct of a minister or a polling clerk or even a Tory voter. It is not without reason that thoughtful people in the liberal as well as conservative ranks are asking themselves, Why this frenzied eagerness to hide the facts? All the high-sounding professions of the premier, made with so fine a semblance of sincerity, are flatly contradicted by the attitude of his government in the case of every inquiry asked for by the opposition. Grave charges have been made, and in the case of the West Huron and Brookville elections a crime against the country had been proved. Yet this fine patriot and his following dare not stand up in the face of the country and say the crime shall be promptly investigated and the guilty punished. These men are not statesmen. A political advantage of more importance to them than the sacredness of a ballot. The support of a contractor is more to be considered than the welfare of the men who went to fight for the Empire. That is the kind of government the people are asked by its paid organs to applaud and to return to power.

ATTRACTING ATTENTION ABROAD.

It is pointed out by the Boston correspondent of the St. John Sun that the corruption in Ontario and Prince Edward Island by the liberal party has attracted considerable attention in the United States. Several leading papers have commented on the ballot frauds in Canada, most of them predicting that the present government at Ottawa will suffer on account of the recent developments. The Providence, R. I., Journal, the foremost paper in the state, says editorially: "The United States is so often held up as an example of political wretchedness that it is not raising to note the progress of the investigations into ballot frauds in Canada. The corruption there which is under investigation was most barefaced. Frauds such as are seldom or never charged in this country were perpetrated. One is amazed at them. It is possible let an American imagine the bitterness of every election officer in a district which was close and doubtful. In the United States the ballot which is counted by fraud is practically never known of in such precincts; The frauds are committed in localities where the vote is all or largely one sided. Our political rascals are brazen, and daring to the last extremity of personal courage, but they are afraid to apply themselves to changing the color of a plurality. In several Canadian districts the conspirators completely overturned pluralities. The debauchery of an electorate has probably never been more complete. Everybody who could be expected to object to the tricks was brought to silence. It was because of that fact that the investigation has been so tardy and tedious. The efforts to discover the circumstances of the crimes have been fought at every step. But the truth is gradually coming to light. A royal commission has been appointed to go over the whole matter carefully. On this intention to reveal the possible rottenness of their political system the Canadians are to be congratulated. Their disgrace demands all the attention they can give it."

DAIRY PRODUCTS.

Cheese is selling on Ontario boards today about a cent and a half per pound higher than the prices of a year ago. Butter in Montreal is from three and a half to four cents higher than the prices of a year ago. The Canadian Grocer figures out that if the same amount of cheese has been marketed thus far as for the like period in 1899 the increased value represents over \$230,000. But as a matter of fact the exports to date are nearly 60,000 boxes more than last year. The enhanced value of butter, compared with an equal volume of sales a year ago, represents, according to the Grocer, about \$80,000. Both the butter and cheese makers are very firm in the west. Friday's Star quotes cheese at 10 to 10 1/2c for western, and says as high as 10 7/8c was paid on one Ontario board; while butter in Montreal for export is held at 20 1/2 to 20c. One factory in Ontario booked an order last week for 32,400 pounds, in 56 lb. boxes for the English market. The outlook for dairy products therefore appears to be excellent.
