Will Fly To Europe



Leading Aircraftman J. A. Gallant, of Coleman, P. E. I., and LAC J. D. Rogers, of Summerside, P. E. I., with the RCAF's 413 Squadron at Bagotville, P. Q., will be among the personnel moving to Europe early in March, weather permitting, when three RCAF Sabre-jet squadrons will fly the Atlantic from RCAF Station Goose Bay, Labrador, via Greenland, Iceland and Scotland to Zweibrucken, Germany, to form No. 3 RCAF Fighter Wing. The two other squadrons in the operation, termed Leap Frog Three, are 427 Squadron, St. Hubert, P. Q., and 434 Squadron, Uplands, Ont.

This will be the third aerial trans-Atlantic mass movement of RCAF Sabre jet fighters, bringing Canadian fighter strength in Europe to 9 squadrons. The Wing will come under the RCAF's Air Division which is to total 12 squadrons, with plans calling for No. 1 Fighter Wing at North Luffenham, England, ultimately to move to a Continental base. North Star transport aircraft of 46 Squadron will accompany the fighters on the flight with groundcrews and equipment. This assures the squadrons of servicing by their own ground crews, familiar with the aircraft and pilots. (NATIONAL DEFENCE PHOTO.)
