HOME FOR INTERMENT.—The body of James L. Cameron, formerly of New London, was brought home for interment last evening. Mr. Cameron died at Hillsborough, N. B., on Wednesday from the effects of a fall sustained the previous Saturday. He was 22 years of age.

RUNAWAY ACCIDENT.—This morning as Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Bryenton were driving into the city from their home at Brackley Point their horse took fright and ran away. Both were thrown out of the carriage. It is said that Mr. Bryenton had his arm broken and that Mrs. Bryenton was also injured.

PAINFUL ACCIDENT.—Yesterday evening as Mr. J. H. Macdonald, the well known baritone singer, was painting his yacht, the Muriel, she fell upon him, causing severe internal injuries. Mr. Macdonald was working under the boat when the supports gave way. At latest accounts he was progressing favorably under the treatment of Dr. Kelly, and it is expected that he will be able to be about again very soon.

BURNED TO DEATH.—The three little children of Charles Watts, of Fernes's Hill, near Pittsburg, Pa., were burned to death a few evenings ago by the explosion of a can of oil. Their clothing was ignited and the children burned so terribly that they died in a short time. The eldest child, with the flames reaching her body, tried to carry her baby brother to a place of safety. The children were playing in an outhouse in the yard and one of them struck a match. When the match was thrown down it dropped into the can of oil and an explosion followed instantly.

BAPTIST CONFERENCE.—The quarterly session of the Island Baptist Conference was held at Cavendish on Tuesday and Wednesday, and was well attended.
