TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Killed on the Car-track.

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 26. A sad accident occurred at Richmond last evening by which a man named Stephen Pollock lost his life. About half-past nine o'clock an engine left the machine shop and was steaming slowly down the track. Pollock is supposed to have been carrying something across the track from one shop to another when the engine probably struck him. An inquest was begun, but all the engine hands swore they knew nothing about the accident, and did not see Pollock on the track either before the accident or afterwards. The inquest was adjourned until to-day at 12 o'clock. Fifteen years ago Pollock kept an hotel at Truro, N. S., but latterly he has been employed around the I. C. R. shops here. His age was 65 years.

A Short-Lived Revolution.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Aug. 26. The Provincial Government, which was created on Saturday last by the Revolutionists, has been overthrown and three of its members have been arrested. The old ministry has been reinstated. The deception practiced upon them by the circulation of a report that Prince Alexander had voluntarily abdicated, has exasperated both troops and civilians alike, and the revolution of popular feeling in favor of the deposed ruler is as general as it is intense. A deputation has started to find the Prince and to assure him of the unwavering loyalty of the Bulgarian troops.

A Coasting Schooner Captured.

ST. JOHN, Aug. 26. The schooner J. Kennedy, of Calais, Me., has been seized at St. Andrew's, N. B., on a charge of carrying coal from Sydney, C. B., to another British port. The coal is owned by Mr. Grimmer, of St. Andrew's, who is also part owner of the schooner.

Collided and Sank.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26. The steamer Queen, which arrived here yesterday, reports that she collided with and sank the schooner Abbie Dunn, of Maine, on a voyage from St. John, N. B., to Washington, D. C., laden with laths. The crew were saved.

A Terror to the "Yanks."

PORTLAND, ME., Aug. 26. The schooner City Point, which was recently fined \$400, at Shelburne, N. S., is now here for repairs. The Capt. will make a sworn deposition to the Consul regarding Capt. Quigley, of the cruiser Terror's treatment of him.

To Defend the Cup.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26. The yacht Mayflower yesterday won the last of the trial races, and has accordingly been selected to meet the English yacht Galatea in the international contest for the America's Cup.

West Indians Again Victorious.

TORONTO, Aug. 26. The West Indian cricketers defeated Toronto's Eleven by one innings and 39 runs.

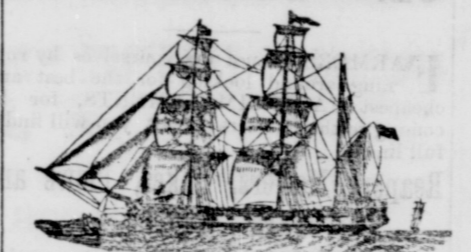

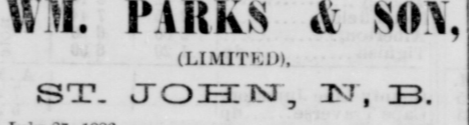

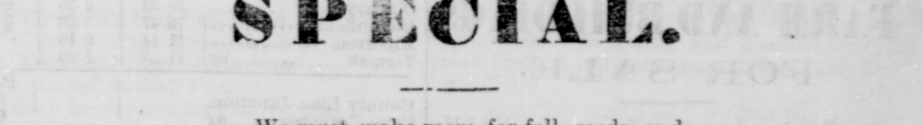
