

MARKETS.

Montreal, July 12.
The Chicago provision market was firm to-day, pork closing higher at \$13.00 bid August, \$13.80 asked September. Lard was steady at \$6.92 1/2 bid August, \$6.92 1/2 bid September. In this market business as usual on Saturday was dull. Inspected mess pork sells at \$16.50 and \$17, and lard in pails at \$10 1/2 and 11c, sales having been made at these figures during the past few days. The demand for smoked hams continues at our quotations, but bacon meets with a very indifferent enquiry. Eggs are in steady request at 13c and 13 1/2c.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Chicago weather has been intensely hot, and a high death rate prevails. The long suffering Americans should emigrate in a body to the Provinces, where they will get plenty sea breezes and fresh air, and on the whole find far more agreeable weather than they have been used to, though we also have our extremes of heat and cold.

LOBSTERS.—The factory at Carriboo, is now doing a very large business in canning lobsters, cooking from 15,000 to 20,000 daily. The farmers in the vicinity of the factory are earning large sums catching the crustacea, in some cases making upwards of \$40 per week. If this occurred in Colorado, or in some place in Yankeedom where men lost their health or their lives for their gain our young men would be rushing by the score to take a hand in the matter, leaving home, farm and all in their mad rush. Happening only at home, like our gold and silver mines, oil wells, etc, only neglect is manifested toward it by those who should catch the opportunity.—*Pictou Standard.*

DEATH BY POISON.—On Monday evening, about tea time, a child of Mr. Richard Welsh, of Spurr's Cove, a little girl aged three years, while playing in the garden about the house, plucked and eat a blue flower growing there, commonly called Blue Rocket. It is also known as Monkshood, but the proper name of it is Aconite, and it is a deadly poison. About nine o'clock the parents of the child were awakened by the little one vomiting violently. A messenger was immediately despatched for Dr. F. MacFarlane, who arrived promptly, but too late to save the life, the little one being dead already. The doctor pronounced it a case of poisoning by aconite. The flower grows without cultivation, is frequently seen in gardens and lawns, and too great care can not be exercised in protecting it from children.—*St. John Sun.*

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Gooseberry Catsup.—Take 10 lbs of gooseberries, 6 lbs of sugar, 3 pints of vinegar; pick off the stem and blossom end of the berries and wash and drain them. Put them into a porcelain kettle with half the sugar, cook them until soft, then strain through a cullender to remove the skins. Then add the vinegar, put in cinnamon, cloves and alspice to taste, put it back in the kettle, and cook slowly 3/4 of an hour. Seal it while hot in fruit jars or bottles.

SODA IN COOKING.—Dr. Horne writes in the *Country Gentleman*:—Above all things, no preparation of soda should enter into any human food. The practice, although common, is the source of much suffering, and any person recommending saleratus in any form in the preparation of our food commits a great wrong. For, as I have heretofore said, no person can long have a stomach free from disease which is the receptacle of soda mixed with the food. This is a positive conclusion beyond contradiction. There is no need of soda in any form. Eggs, milk and cream are all sufficient for light, delicate, healthy food, and as a luxury. Even such food should only be partaken of quite moderately, as it is too rich for constant use, for any stomach which desires to remain healthy. I would not be understood to decry good living, for I am fond of good living, and indulge occasionally in that which brings a penalty, often quite serious. I never, however, partake of everything to eat or drink, of which soda forms a prominent part.

News from the west coast of Africa states that trade there is greatly interfered with by the withdrawal from the gold coast of all American dollars. The Governor has gone to Lagos to try to settle the difficulties.

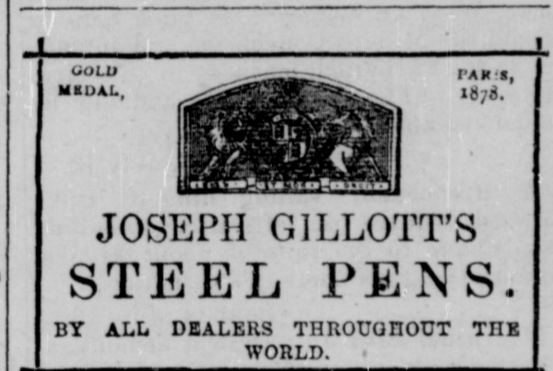
